# Swimmers better bests at OFFSA

The GDHs Rebel swimteam swam in a nice straight line at the OFSAA competition earlier this week in the Etobicoke Olympian pool.

The team is still unsure . their placing in Ontario but

two individuals and one relay team led the Rebs to a successful and exciting meet.

At press time coach Tom Adams only had received the top 12 finishers in each event as well as team standings and Heather Clarke proved

to be the best Rebel as she placed an oustanding seventh in the 100 m back stroke in a time of 1:15.00.

Clarke and the other members were up against some stiff competitions from club swimmers which compete at

least four hours a day compared to the Rebels training programs of just two hours. All other high schools are like this and have to face the same problem.

"If we are coming close to the club swimmers time wise we know that we are doing a good job," coach Tom Adams sald.

The girls 200 free relay team, consisting of Clarke, Cheryl Thompson, Suzanne Abray and Mary Lynn Morrow placed an amazing fourth just missing the bronze medal with a time of 2:02:5.

"The relay team swam very well. I was pleased with their time," coach Adams said.

Clarke and the relay team were the only Rebels that made it to the finals.

One other swimmer that placed in the top 12 was Cheryl Thompson who finished eleventh in the 100 free with a time of 1:07:5.

There were 68 schools involved in the competition and Vincent Massey from Windsor won the overall girls and Guelph Centennial took both the boys overall and team crown.

"The team went to swim their best times. We know they were not going to beat all club swimmers but our goal was to make the kids improve and they did just that. Everyone I think swam their best times," Adams said.

Lord Elgin, the Rebs number contender in the Halton and Peel-Halton championships this year did not qualify for any finals.

"We represented our county very well, everyone improved and enjoyed themselves. That's what's so exciting for me as a coach, seeing everyone improve," Adams concluded.

"Peter was asleep for just one second during that match and it cost him a gold or silver," Smith said.

Fournier went all the way to the consolation finals which he won quite handily.

"He dominated everyone after his first match and became the wrestler we all know," the coach said.

Riley ended up winning the gold medal.

Mike Taylor, another bronze medalist, also competed in the consolation round because of an early 055.

In his defeat he had the edge throughout the match until the last 10 seconds when he attempted a hip toss but his competitor countered his move and won by a close 7-6 margin.

"Mike came back Saturday after that defeat on Friday and totally cleaned up on the rest of the field," Smith said.

The most oustanding wrestler was Frank Medzinski according to Smith as he had an excellent meet only. losing one match which kept him out of the gold and silver medals.

He started swimming with the Halton team run by the recreation department six year ago. Then two year ago, Eric entered high school and

started swimming for the school team. He's 15 years old and enrolled into grade 10 classes averaging around the 73 per cent range.

Eric sill has three years left in high school and hopes to take his swimming abilities on into university.

In the recent OFSAA meet, Eric swam against grade 12 and 13 students and placed an unofficial fourteenth spot.

"There were a lot of club swimmers and it made competitions very stiff," Elson said. "There were even some Canadian record holders there so I felt good about placing where I did."

Last year Elson was having a good year until he broke his nose and this cancelled his trip to OFSAA. He swam his personal best time at OFSAA this year. "I was quite pleased with my 100 fly time, I didn't think I

would break the 1:10:0 mark.

So we at The Herald congratulate Eric Elson on a fine showing this season.

He lost his second match to a grade 13 student and Frank is only in grade 11. The score was 7-0.

"He too came back on Saturday after his defeat on Friday and he pinned the first opponent," Smith sald. "The three matches were a little tougher as he won all three by just one point."




