## Rotary Juveniles down two to Orillia in OMHA playoffs

Heading into last night's third game, the Georgetown Rotary International Juveniles were behind the eight ball trailing Orillia two games to none in their OMHA playoff series.

The Juveniles were nipped in the first game of the series 5-4 up north and in the second game here Sunday they were trounced 10-3.

Orillia pulled ahead again 5:09 into the final period but once more Georgetown fought back to tie it up. This time Paul Gingras was the marksman with Dave Kent-head setting him up. Orillia then popped home the winner.

It was a totally different story in the second game as after the first period it was all Orillia.

After the first period Orillia led by only a 2-1 score. Billy Taylor, from Bruce McCandless and Gary Thompson, got Georgetown's lone goal.

In the second period Orillia scored four straight goals and it was over.

Late in the period Jeff Hubert, who was Georgetown's best player on the night, got one of the goals back from Paul Morrow.
