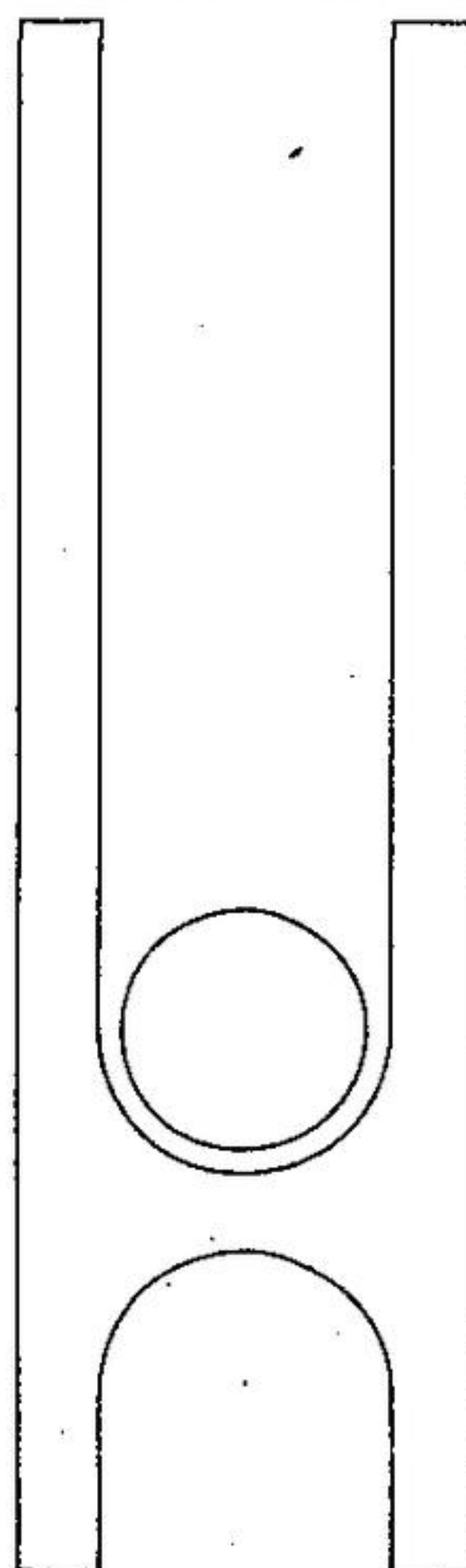
Police have no suspects, but are continuing their investigation.
