Their car was hit by another car backing out of a driveway which caused the accident. One of the girls received a serious injury to her back. The driver and the other girls were less seriously hurt.

The second accident happened in the village of Ballinafad in the village of Ballinafad right across from the store. There were two cars involved in this accident also. There was no serious injury to the occupants of the cars. It effected many residents of the village and surrounding countryside, as one of the cars smashed head on into a main hydro pole, breaking it in two. It happened about 4:30 on Friday afternoon resulting in the power being off in a large area. It was not until around 11 p.m. that some evening that the hydro crew had repaired some of the damage and the lights came on again. Residents on the 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th lines were without power and those living on the side roads in the same area were affected also.

It is a few miles from Ballinafad but was in the black-out area. There had not been any heat in the recreation room since hydro went off at 4:30 that afternoon. Two men of the group who were used to camping up north went to their homes for Coleman lanterns. Tables were set up in livingroom, den and kitchen. familiar with. As the warmth from the furnace was felt in every corner, the weatherman had favoured with a fairly warm night. It turned out to be a memorable evening but one all enjoyed.

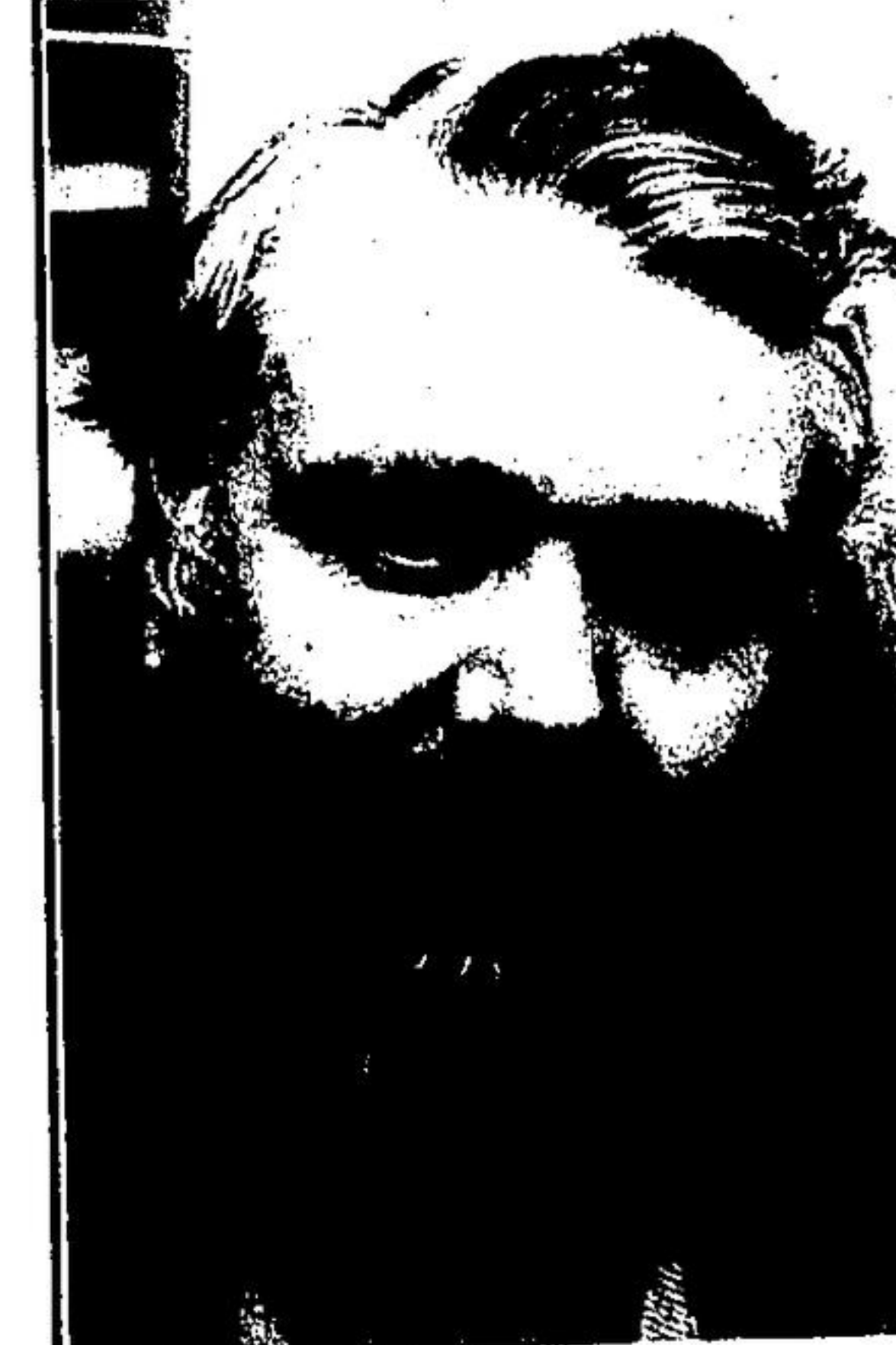
