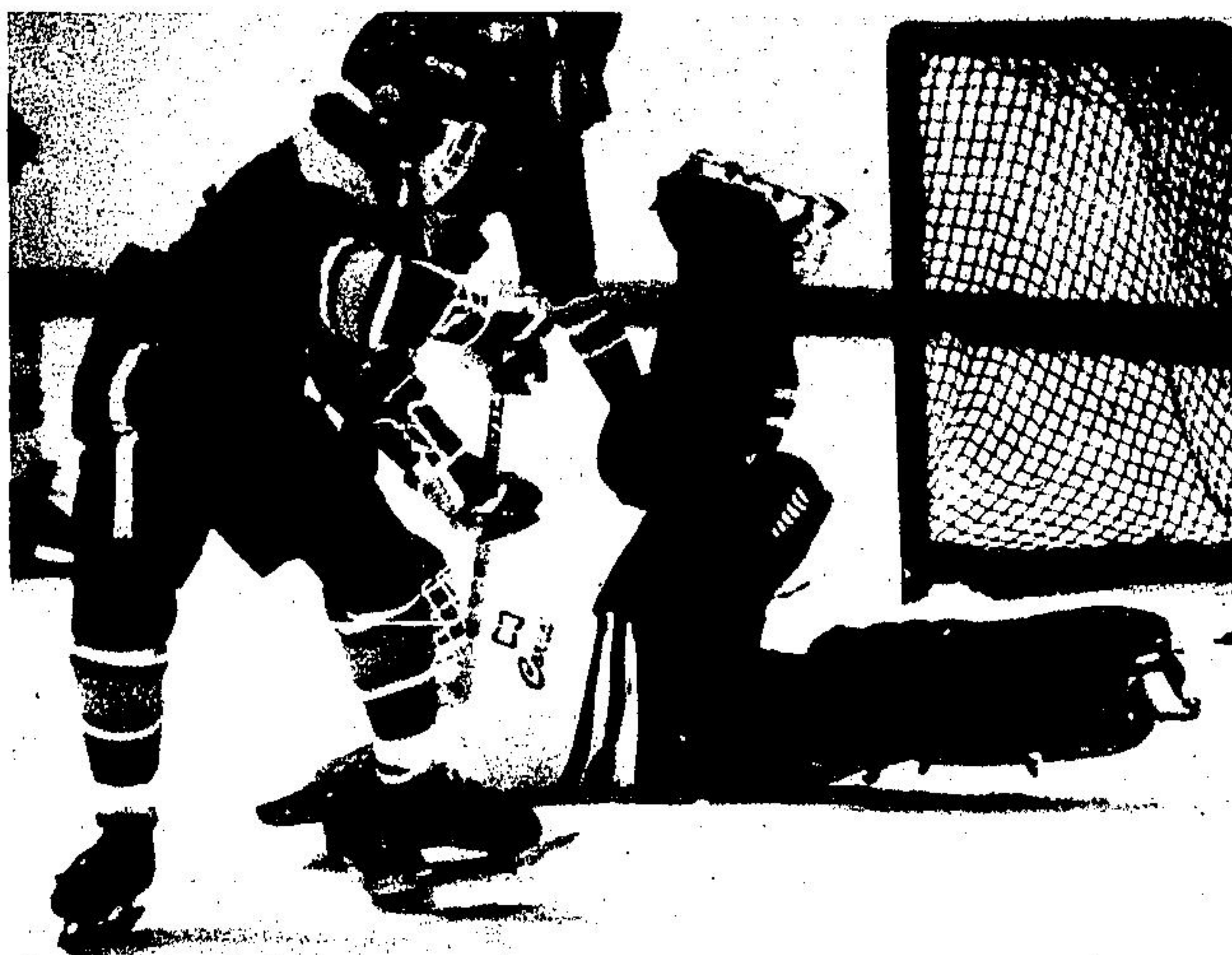

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## Clark finishes fifth in worlds

## Brian Hayward second team all-star in Ivy League play

Brian Hayward of Georgetown, who now attends Cornell University and is first string goalie on the school's hockey team, was recently named to the second team of the all-star 1979 All-Ivy squad. The freshman had a season's record of 18 wins and six losses. Also selected for the first squad were Lance Nethery of Burlington, Brock Tredway of Highland Creek and Rob Gemmell of Mississauga. The All-Ivy squad is chosen every year by the league coaches.

The young skaters compiled a surprising 21-8 overall record for the season and finished third, in the ECAC playoffs, beating defending NCAA champion Boston University 7-4, in the consolation game.

Coach Dick Bertrand took 13 new faces and molded

them into a hard skating team, one that excited Cornell fans all season long. Seven members of the team were freshmen. It was the ninth consecutive time that Bertrand has led the Red into the playoffs in as many years as head coach at Cornell.

Hayward tended the nets in 25 games and allowed 95 goals for a 3.83 average. He made 721 saves for a percentage of .885. The fresh goaltender compiled an 18-6 record and recorded two shutouts.

Nethery, the senior center who was named All-American for the second time in 1979, led the team in scoring with 65 points on 18 goals and 47 assists, playing in 27 of the team's 29 games. With 271 points in his four-year career, he is the ECAC Division I all-time leading scorer. Nethery's 180 career assists

is also an ECAC record. The 6-0, 200-pounder scored 91 career goals to tie the school record.

Tredway was the team's second leading scorer with 60 points. His 31 goals was tops on the team and his 16 power play tallies set a new school seasonal record. Tredway had five hat tricks to tie the school seasonal best mark.

Gemmell was the Big Red's third leading scorer with 15 goals and 37 assists for 52 points. He scored a hat trick against Northeastern and got the winning goal four minutes into the overtime period in the quarterfinal win over Providence.

On the powerplay, the Red scored 37 goals in 119 tries for a .311 percentage, while allowing the opposition just 25 tallies in 135 attempts for a .185 mark. Gemmell led the

team in short-handed goals with two.

The hottest scorer at the end of the season was junior winter Brian Marrett of Toronto. Marrett scored nine goals in the team's last seven games, including the hat trick against BU in the final contest of the year.

In looking at the season, Coach Bertrand said, "This team developed a winning attitude and played extremely well together. When you think of how many new faces we had, it was amazing. We're going to miss our six seniors, but we feel that we still have the makings of a fine team. With the experience gained by our returnees, plus hopefully a number of talented freshmen coming in, we are already looking forward to an excellent season in 1979-80".

Ian Clark of Georgetown district high school finished a fantastic fifth in world junior cross-country championships held Sunday in Limerick, Ireland.

Clark, who has been having an amazing year, covered the 7.4-kilometre course in 23 minutes, 29 seconds. He was only 27 seconds behind Eddy de Pauw of Belgium, who won the event.

Clark was the most successful Canadian runner at the meet. His nearest rival was Belleville's Dennis Stark who finished twenty-second. Clark and Stark have had several thrilling duels in the last few years, but it appears now that the Georgetown runner is in a class by himself among Canadian junior runners.

Clark was the winner of the OFSAA cross-country title in September and then he went on to win the Canadian Junior title in Victoria, British Columbia. He has also run very successfully indoors throughout the winter.

Mike Dixon, another Georgetown native, ran in the senior men's division and he finished ninety-seventh.

Dixon was among the top Canadians as only three of his countrymen finished ahead of him.

Peter Butler of Calgary was the top Canadian as he finished fifty-sixth. The senior race was run over 12,000 metres.

## Bants lose 10-1

After two close, exciting wins the Georgetown DRG Stallionery Bantams were defeated 10-1 by Richmond Hill to be knocked out of the Bantam tournament.

The fact that Richmond Hill went onto win the "B" division had to be some consolation for coach Jack Gudgeon and his Georgetown troops.

Before the tournament began Gudgeon said that he wanted to get further in this year's event than his squad managed to get last year.

In the 1978 event Georgetown was knocked out in the second round in overtime by Woodstock. They went to overtime before losing 8-7.

This year the bants went to the third round. The match

against Richmond Hill was the "B" division semi-final.

After Richmond Hill took a 2-0 lead in the first period of the first game it appeared Georgetown might come back.

Early in the second period defenseman Mike Doucette talked from Mike Marcolink and Anthony Oram to get Georgetown back to within one.

However, before the first game had ended Richmond Hill had pumped home four more goals and they had a big 6-1 lead heading into the evening match.

In the evening Richmond Hill scored one in the first period, two in the second and one more in third and took the 10-1 lead.

## Raiders busy

The series started last night here in Georgetown.

The second game will be played tonight in Thorold.

The third game will be back here on Friday and after that it is four games in four nights if they are all needed.

The fourth game will be Sunday night in Thorold.

Monday they will be in Georgetown. Tuesday they will be back in Thorold and on Thursday the seventh game would be in Georgetown. The fifth, sixth and seventh games are all played only if necessary.

It will be the first team to take eight points. The teams will play one overtime period if the score is tied after regulation play. If the teams are still tied they will both be awarded one point.
