

Raiders lose opening match 8-6

The Thorold Athletics struck first in the Intermediate southern division final with a 8-6 victory over the Raiders at Alcott Arena last Tuesday. The Raiders ap-

peared to be suffering the affects of a lacklustre semi-final against the Fort Erie Frontiers.

The Raider who seemed most affected by the month

without serious competition was goaltender Peter McDuffe.

The netminder was beaten with a couple of cheap goals early and never really reco-

vered as he was only able to stop 18 shots. According to the official game sheet Bill Cheropita made 43 stops in the Athletic net.

CHEAP GOAL
The Athletics got on the

board first when Sam Smith's low shot found its way by McDuffe, who managed to get only a piece of the shot which was launched from just inside the blueline. It came at the 3:59 mark.

Approximately four minutes later Jim Briggs fired a high shot from the same distance. McDuffe got his glove on the shot, but it had enough left to make it into the net.

The Raider netminder could not be faulted for the third Athletic goal of the period. Dave Lair and Tom Kelly broke in alone on McDuffe. Kelly took his teammates' pass and put it in an empty net.

The shots in the first period were seven for the Athletics and 15 for the Raiders. Cheropita made a few good saves, but most of the Raider shots were not too dangerous.

The Raiders finally got on the board 4:40 into the second period when Terry Porter fired a slapshot in from the blueline. Cheropita was screened on the play. Brad Pirie earned an assist on the goal.

There was no more scoring until the 12:39 mark of the period when Tom Daley scored while the Raiders were shorthanded. Ron Twiss and Peter Sturgeon set him up.

The Athletics got that one back less than two minutes later when Smith got his second of the night.

The Raiders got to within one for the first time in the game approximately two minutes later as Ron Twiss, playing in the forward position after spending the season on defense, tallied from Scott McKenzie and Pirie.

To McDuffe's credit he settled down in the second period and made some good stops.

GUNNING
Both teams came out gunning in the third period and at one point it appeared the last shot on net would win.

Early in the third period the Raiders tied the score when Doug Heslop, the thi newcomer to the line, scored from Sturgeon and Bill Currie.

The Athletics quickly counter-punched as only 33 seconds later Lair put the puck by McDuffe.

The Raiders tied the score for a second time when captain Ray Tonelli completed a play started by Collin Gordon.

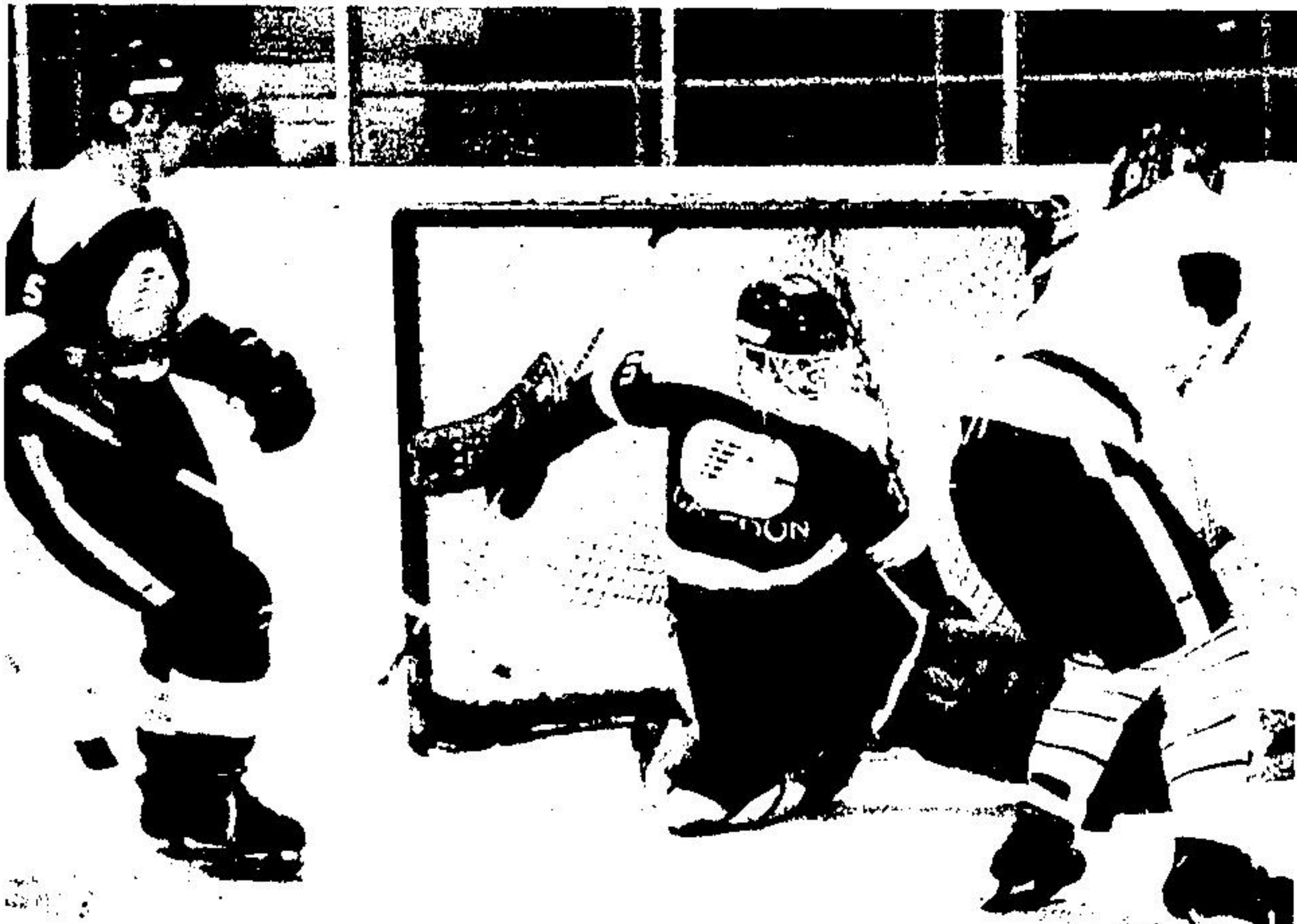
Midway through the period the Athletics scored the game's only power play marker to take the lead once more. Smith was the marksman.

The Raiders bounced back for a third time as Ray Evans put one home from Gordon.

Gino Farinacci scored what turned out to be the winner with just under three minutes remaining to be played.

In the final minute Raider coach Gerry Inglis pulled his netminder in favor of a sixth attacker. The Raiders did not have any good scoring chances and the move eventually backfired when Peter Mara put the puck into the empty net.

There was one fight in the game. Heslop won a unanimous decision over Gary Landry, who was sporting a face mask in game two to ensure his healing face wasn't further damaged.

Philp downs Chiefs in four

As expected Philp Publishing is meeting Norval in the Georgetown Industrial Hockey League championship round. Philp earned the second berth in that final with a 5-3 victory over the Caledon Chiefs Sunday which gave them the semi-final series seven points to three.

Norval has been idle for more than two weeks after easily disposing of Way-Jay in the other semi-final.

The final got underway last night. GHHL fans are asked to keep an eye on the sign in front of Alcott Arena for the dates of the other games.

The Chiefs did not go out without giving it a good battle. The series was very tight throughout and on Sunday it appeared the Chiefs were going to force a sixth and deciding game.

Caledon came out flying and built up a 3-0 lead before Philp, who looked unorganized and uninspired through the game's first half, got rolling.

TIGHT FIRST

The first period was very tight with the two club's both unwilling to give their respective opponents an inch.

Kevin Judge put the Chiefs on the board first when he

tallied from Rick Rodgers and Rod Halls at the 17:55 mark of the opening frame. The goal came after Ron Osborne had made several sparkling saves in the Philp net to keep the game scoreless.

It only took the Chiefs 40 seconds of the second period to notch the game's second marker. Ernie Schaump was the marksman with Bill Davis and Steve Rowland setting him up.

At the 13:40 mark it appeared the Chiefs were going to tie the series when Rowland made it 3-0 with Dave Schaump setting him up.

With less than three minutes remaining to be played in that second period Philp finally got on track. Roger Chapman scored the winning goal with Bob Riley and John Quackenbush setting him up.

Less than one minute later Philp got to within one goal as Bob Osborne tallied from Vince Micallef.

The two late second period goals gave Philp all the momentum heading into the final 20 minutes.

However, the Chiefs hung tough and that one-goal margin stood up until very late in the game.

It was not until the 14:15

mark of the period that Nick Belviso tallied from Riley. The third goal was all Philp actually needed. A tie would have given them six points and the series.

The chiefs started pressing in an attempt to tally the winning goal and it left a few holes in their defense.

At 15:49 Bob Osborne gave Philp the lead for the first time with Bert Osborne and John Quackenbush drawing the assists.

In the final minute the Chiefs, needing two goals to prolong the series, pulled their netminder in favor of an extra attacker. Bob Osborne completed his hat trick by firing one into the empty net. Bert Osborne assisted.

It was surprisingly tough

series. Philp, who had a very good regular season, were expected to handle the Chiefs with less trouble.

Philp will be very hard pressed to knock off Norval, the reigning GHHL champs, off their throne. One hope for Philp is that the more than two weeks layoff may have hindered Norval. If so the Philp may be able to jump on them in the first couple of games.

In Brian Beaumont and Dave Holmes Norval has the league's two best centres. Both can set up plays and also put the puck home themselves when the opportunity presents itself. If Philp cannot stop those two big guns the series may be over in a hurry.
