## Ontario Outdoors

In the next four weeks you should get your tackle ready. The regular trout season opens April 28 and it will take a lot of preparation, if you want things to go well at that time.

CLEAN your fly line and give a little stretch in order to get the winter "set" out of it. If you had hung it in loose coils as I suggested last fall, it will be in good shape.

Dress out your collection of flies and replace those lost or that you wish to add to the collection. Of course leaders need to be checked out and preferably replaced.

Start the season off with a fresh leader and inspect the others for quality and quantity. If you did not service your reels and rods before putting them away, better get at it Rods should be varnished and the guides checked for wear and loose windings. When was the last time you opened your reels?? Metal wear can mix with grease to clog the workings and stiffen them up. This is how you will find a broken or worn part before the big day.

AT OWEN SOUND one year, I watched a reel explode under the pressure of a good fish. It was found to be messy inside with worn and gummed up parts. While fishing the KEY RIVER with a few men, two of them lost monster pike to Jammed reels. The drags seized up and the line snapped. Add to this the task of making sure that all hooks are sharp or are replaced, then you will need the next four weeks and you will be busy.

If you like to troll it can still be done and the surging movement of a paddle stroke often enhances the action of a lure. A motor can be added to the stern of some canoes, and others may be fitted with a cross brace and the motor placed to the side.


