He said Mr. Ferguson is the only new appointee who can claim to represent any industrial interests. He asked to be provided with a list of all 21 EEAC members and their backgrounds to "see if they're meeting their original objec-

Coun. Roy Booth of Halton Hills told council that the planning committee, which he chairs, recommended the appointment of all six applicants whose names the EEAC had submitted to provide the EEAC with as wide a cross -section of backgrounds and interests as possible.

The EEAC, he said, had asked the planning committee to endorse four of the candidates for appointment and to select one of the other two applicants as well. Mr. Casson is presient of Bio-Environmental Services Ltd. in Georgetown and as such can be considered a representative of local industry, he said.
