What is happening this year?

Ten teams to compete in industrial league

SIX GAMES
To qualify for the playoffs a player must participate in at least six regular season games.

If a team defaults two games they will be disqualified from further play and also lose their deposit. If a team shows up for all its games they will get their \$50 back at the end of the season.


