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sharing costs with the north through the region's new equalized assessment policy. The treasurer acknowledged that Halton Hills would have "benefited dramatically" this year had the policy been implemented earlier.

While the Halton Hills mill rate is rising about 22 per cent in Georgetown and 47 per cent in Acton, the Milton rate will increase only 2.6 per cent and Oakville's 13.3 per cent.

In Burlington, taxpayers will benefit from a relatively large assessment increase and pay about 2.3 per cent less than last year.

Out of \$36.7 million in 1979 expenses, the region will recover about \$19.2 million from provincial grants and other revenue, leaving its taxpayers to contribute \$17,303,360. The final amount to be raised at the area level shows an increase over 1978 of about 10 per cent, but according to Mr. Farmer, reflects the failure of government grants to increase at the same rate as inflation.

Before council accepted a recommendation to approve the 1979 budget, several members introduced amendments aimed at cutting portions of the budget allocated to specific projects. The only amendment that won council's support, however, involved the internal transfer of budgeted funds and had no effect on the budget total.

Among the areas of funding suggested for reductions were mileage allowances for council members (approved at \$12,200) promotion of tourism (\$5,872) and grants to the Hamilton Philharmonic Orchestra (\$5,000) and the Royal Botanical Gardens (\$31,000).

Included in the region budget is \$1,958,671 for general government expenses, \$10,916,938 for protection to persons and property (police and conservation authorities), \$10,996,000 for public works \$579,472 for community planning and development, \$124,550 for recreation and community services, \$4,017,990 for conservation of health (Halton region health unit) and \$8,072,293 for social and family services.

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Break-in at GDHS nets fire extinguishers

Three fire extinguishers were the only items missing following a break-in at Georgetown District High School on the weekend.

Police were alerted to the break-in when the school's alarm went off. When the investigating officers arrived on the scene, they discovered the break-in. The burglars gained entry by way of an unlocked window on the second floor. A chemical fire extinguisher and two water fire extinguishers are reported missing.

Two panes in the upper part of a window at St. Francis of Assisi School were broken some time Monday evening. Damage is estimated at \$50.

Personal property valued at \$500 was stolen during a break-in in a home just outside Georgetown.

Four flags, valued at \$72, were stolen from the Neilson warehouse earlier this week.

Vandals pulled up a stop sign and several street signs from different areas in Georgetown, and left them lying on the ground where they had been removed.

Thieves stole 260 bales of hay from a barn on the south side of Highway 7 between Mississauga Road and the 5th Line on the weekend. Value of the hay is estimated at \$390.

A purse containing a wallet, personal papers, and a black Alaskan diamond ring was stolen from the locker room of the Acton pool.

Four Rally Sport chrome hubcaps were stolen from a 1975 Corvette parked on John Street on Friday. The value of the hubcaps is estimated at \$250.

An Acton resident reports being beaten while he was sitting in the 747 Club in Acton. He was treated in Guelph Hospital for bruises and cuts. A man has been charged in connection with the incident.

Vandals caused \$35 damage to a truck parked at the Ashgrove BP Centre when they kicked in a left rear fender.

Vandals also ripped the front seat of a car belonging to an Acton woman while it was parked in the Georgetown Market parking lot.

An eight-track tape deck was stolen from a vehicle parked at Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital.

An Acton resident reports that following a dispute with a friend over the purchase of a car, his friend struck him in the face several times. Police are continuing their investigation.

An Esqueping resident reports that someone broke into his garage while he was on vacation, and stole two motorcycle helmets. The burglars got in by way of an insecure rear door. Both helmets can be identified.

Board mileage rate up

The Halton board of education voted Thursday to increase the mileage rate for board employees and trustees using their own cars for board business.

The board approved a recommendation by its finance committee, which said the mileage rate for the first 5,000 miles per year should remain at 22 cents a mile, rather than increasing to 22.5 cents. However, the rate for travel in excess of 5,000 miles a year will be increased to 17 cents a mile from 16 cents. The proposed increase had been 18 cents.

The rate for itinerant teachers is being increased from \$28 to \$30 a month.
