Board mileage rate

The Halton board of education voted Thursday to increase the mileage rate for board employees and trustees using their own cars for board busi-

The board approved a recommendation by its finance committee, which said the mileage rate for the first 5,000 miles per year should remain at 22 cents a mile, rather than increasing to 22.5 cents. However, the rate for travel in excess of 5,000 miles a year will be increased to 17 cents a mile from 16 cents. The proposed increase had been 18 cents.


