The referee for the game was Bill Divorski who did many of the Georgetown Raider playoff games this year. In the game Divorski issued a five-minute high sticking penalty against a St. Kitts player. While that major was being served Divorski gave another St. Kitts player a two-minute minor.

While the two players were off the Derbys talked. The player who received the minor jumped back on the ice, but Divorski put him back in. The call meant that St. Kitts was two men short for the full two-minute minor although a goal was scored.

As of presstime OHA officials had not ruled on the St. Catharines protest.

The Derbys went onto win the second game 3-1 and then jumped ahead three games to none with a 7-4 victory.

Pickells takes second place

Bill Pickells of the Northern Karate Club in Norval placed second at the Canadian-American Tournament of Champions held in Cleveland Ohio over the weekend.

Pickells was one of three seeded competitors in the black belt kata division. Cynthia Rothboth, another seed, edged out Pickells for first place.

The scoring between the two was very close with Rothboth scoring a half a point more than Pickells on one of the five judges cards. Both Pickells and Rothboth, who were way ahead of the field, were given perfect 10 scores by a judge apiece.

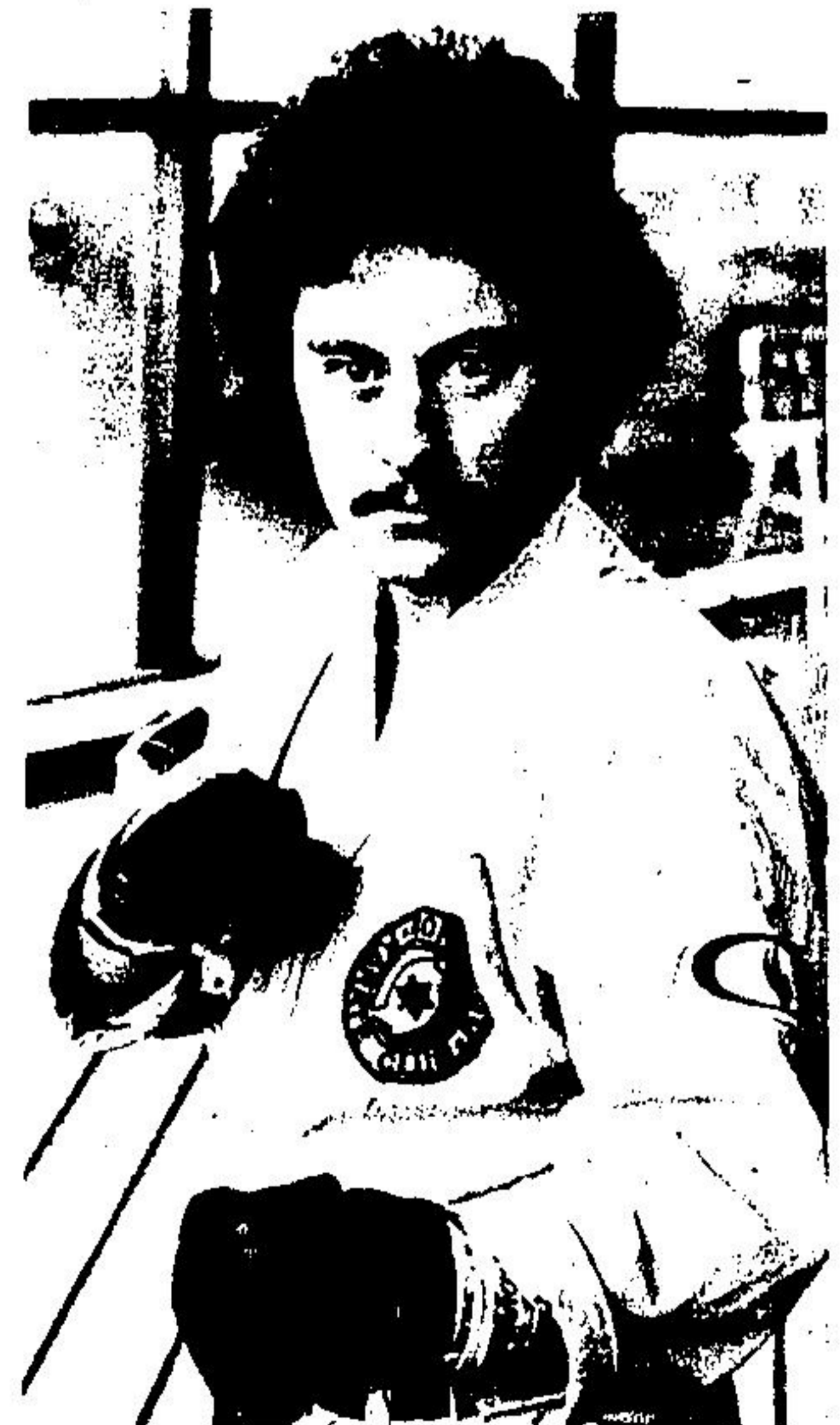
Pickells said that the winner of the women's grand Championship fighting event at his tournament will receive a 14-carat gold pendant.
