Constable's suicide

Police cleared of negligence

The Halton Regional Police Commission has decided that the superior officers of Constable Bar v MacDonald, the Halton Regional Police officer who committed suicide at the graveside of his girlfriend, did all that could be reasonably expected to determine the constable's state of mind, prior to his death

Constable MacDonald's girlfriend had committed suicide a week earlier, and the constable was granted three days compassionate leave in addifrom to his regular two days off. On his first shift back on duty. he drove the cruser to the cemetery where his friend was buried, and shot himself in the chest, while standing beside her grave

Commussion chairman Harry Barrett said the officer's superior officers observed him after he returned to duty, and he showed no signs or make strain. As a compassionate gesture, another officer was assigned to patrol with Con-

 stable MacDonald, "in case he wanted to talk", but Mayor Barrett said the officers had no reason to think he was unduly despondent, other than what would be normal under the circumstances.

Mayor Barrett said he does not anticipate any changes in policy regarding compassionate leave, or any other policy connected with bereavement. He expressed the regret of the commission and its "deepest sympathy" to the families of the two young people. Constable MacDonald was 21, and had been with the force for three years

Mayor Barrett said the force conducts psychological testing of recruits before they are taken on strength, and periodically during their career, if they are up for promotion Constable MacDonald had tested "well above average" in his tests.

Mayor Barrett said an officer who wishes any kind of

counselling can make a recounselling or debt counselquest to his superior officer, and if an officer's superiors, his fellow officers or the association feel he needs assis-
