# Halton Agriculture Report

AGRICREW ANNOUNCED By Henry J. Stanley

The program, "Agricrew" has been designed to provide a practical work experience for young people during the summer of 1979. The program is to offer 320 positions. Crews will be placed in selected areas of Ontario to work as a team under a subsidized government program.

As a part of an "Agricrew" team members will be placed on farms and asked to do jobs that may not have been done because of the volume of regular farm work. In addition crew members could be hired to assist with harvest during seasonal periods. An Agricrew could also be hired to help agricultural societies prepare their grounds for rural community fairs.

Agricrew members be over 15 years of age as of May 1. 1979, and are expected to remain on assigned work for the full period of the work agreement. They will be selected on their willingness to perform agricultural manual labour.

The employers are to be engaged in farming full time and will be required to sign a work agreement indicating work to be done, method of payment and alternate work plans for inclement weather. Crews may also be employed by agricultural socieites.

Agricultural employers may request the services of one crew only. The maximum number of work agreements any on farmer can make with Agricrew is limited to five days over the program period.

All Agricrew members will be required to participate in any orientation sessions planned for them by the co-ordinators. The orientation sessions will help train crew members in various skills associated with farm work. Agricrews are required to work as a team, not to be subdivided the. 4 crew members + foreman), under the direct supervision of the crew foreman.

All Agricrew employees are hired by the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food at the following wages: Foremen -\$3.50 an hour and Crew Members - \$3.00 an hour. The farmer pays the co-ordinator a cheque payable to the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food in the amount of \$90.00 for the services of the Agricrew for each day's work. At the conclusion of the program, O.M.A.F. will reimburse the farmer \$15.00 per day for the total number of work agreements made throughout the summer.

Application forms for the positions of foreman or crew members are available at the agricultural office, Milton.

### Farm. Board

Farmers to have voice on

Farm Machinery Board Agriculture and Food Minister Bill Newman has announced measures to answer farmers' complaints about machinery repairs and spare parts.

He said the Ontario Farm Machinery Board will be reconstituted to provide for broader representation by both farmers and industry. The board will figve a responsibilily to assure farm machinery service and educational programs for farmers.

Mr. Newman also said manufacturers, distributors and dealers are working towards a voluntary code of practice to assure repair and parts. It would also establish standard purchase contracts and minimum warranties.

Annual sales of farm machi nery in Ontario amount to \$300 million, and Ontario farmers make up 22 per cent of the Canadian market for farm machinery.
