

Fifteen up for Builder Award

Nominations for the Sports Builder Award, being sponsored by the Halton Hills Herald and Miracle Foodmart, have officially closed with 14 individuals and one service club eligible to win the award.

The committee of John McCauley, Rick McArthur, Brian James, Ruby Wilkes, Len Harrison and Michael Hollett will now meet to decide on a winner and two runners up.

The nominations for the award were purely done on the part of the public. There may be some individuals or clubs which deserved the recognition of a nomination and consideration for the award, but they will not be considered.

Several of the nominees received more than one nomination. The top one received six.

The decision for the committee will be a very difficult one as all the nominees have made a great contribution to making sports better in Georgetown.

However, it will be their job to come up with a winner and two runners up. Ties for the top award will not be possible as the committee's chairman, Halton Hills Herald sports editor Tony Panacci, will vote if the committee is deadlocked.

Following is a list of the nominees and a very brief story on what each has done.

RED ASSELTINE

He was one of the organizers of the Georgetown International Bantam Hockey Tournament and he sat as its chairman for several years. He was also an active member of the Georgetown Minor Hockey Support Group for many years and also served in many capacities in Georgetown's old Junior "B" hockey club.

DON FENDLEY

Don Fendley is a pure behind the scenes man. He has served as trainer, manager or coach with many

hockey teams and baseball teams and is now involved with the executive of the Georgetown Ball Hockey Association. This past season he was manager of the Georgetown Raiders. He is the general manager of the new Halton Rural Midget Girls' team in town.

JACK GUDGEON SR.

Gudgeon is an original member of the Georgetown Minor Hockey Support Group. He was also one of the original organizers of the Georgetown Bantam International Tournament. For many years he was coach in the minor hockey program in Georgetown.

JIM HALL

Hall is a physical education teacher at Centennial Middle School. Hall of course works in almost all school sports, but his specialty is wrestling. Last year he was a coach of the Canadian National Schoolboy Team. He will again be a coach with the team this year. Hall has been chosen as one of 15 Canadians to travel to the Soviet Union to study their wrestling program.

ROBERT HOOPER

At present Hooper is the president of the Georgetown Raider Hockey Club, a post he has held for two seasons. Before becoming president he was the general manager of the team. He was also a manager of Tri-county and house league teams in town as well as an executive member of the Junior "B" team.

GERRY INGLIS

Inglis is one of the most successful coaches Georgetown has ever had. His teams have won several Ontario championships. He has coached the Georgetown Raiders, who he led to the OHA title this past year. He also has served as coach of Tri-county teams in the past. The nominator also says that Inglis has been in the

background of many sporting events in town.

DAVE KENTNER

Kentner expends his energies into many sporting events in town. He is a past president of the Raiders and still is on the team's executive. He was very involved with setting up the Halton Hills Athlete of the Year Award and also had the original concept of having the Hockey Heritage Award and Hockey Heritage Dinner. He is also involved with the Support Group.

HARRY LEVY

Levy has been the chairman of the Georgetown International Bantam Hockey Tournament for the

past 14 years, a project he has worked tirelessly at making a success. He first became involved in the tournament as a member of the klansmen. His involvement evolved to the point where for the past

decade he has run the whole show.

LIONS CLUB

They were nominated for their work in helping build sports facilities and for their sponsorship of many events. They had major involvements with rebuilding the arena, building the outdoor pool, tennis courts and parks and also sponsor many teams in the area.

KEN McMILLAN

McMillan has been involved in many facets of the local hockey scene for many, many years. He is a past president of the Ontario Hockey Association and is the original chairman of the Hockey Heritage Council. He is also very involved in the various horse shows in town.

HERB ROBINSON

He is an original member of the Georgetown Minor Hockey Support Group. He was also very involved with

the old Georgetown "Beavers" Junior "B" team and also with the old Junior "C" Raiders. He also was involved in the original forming of the Tri-county loop.

GERRY PERKINS

Perkins has been a referee of house league hockey and Rep Hockey for the past 25 years. He is a convener with the Ontario Minor Hockey Association. He also is the head official of the Georgetown Minor International Bantam Tournament. During the summer Perkins is the Umpire-in-chief of the Georgetown Industrial Fastball League. He has been an organizer of many sporting events and fundraising drives.

IRENE McCAULEY

She organized and promoted the women's recreational basketball league. The league is now

completing its sixth year and is now represented in the Ontario League.

ROBERT TOST

Tost has spent the last 20 or so years of his life very involved in hockey in town. For the past four years he has been the general manager of the Georgetown Gemina's Junior "B" team. Before that he served in various capacities in the Georgetown District Minor Hockey Association and the Hockey Support Group.

BRYAN TURNER

Turner is a driving force behind the Georgetown Youth Soccer program in town. As well as being on the executive he also coaches the Major Mosquito team. He is also a member of the Georgetown Minor Hockey Support Group and a member of the Georgetown Raider executive.

Daniell his best at Ottawa

Bob Daniell of Georgetown ran the marathon of his life to finish thirtieth overall at the national Capital Marathon run in Ottawa Sunday.

Daniell ran the marathon course of 26 miles, 385 yards in a time of two hours and 33 minutes, the fastest time he has ever recorded for a marathon.

The time was not only good enough to give Daniell thirtieth overall in a field of thousands but it was also give him second place in the Master's category. To qualify as a master a runner must be 40 years of age or older. Daniell is 40 years old.

The Ottawa event was the seventh marathon Daniell has ever competed in. To illustrate how well he ran the course Jeremone Drayton, who is generally recognized as Canada's best marathoner for any age group, covered the distance in two hours and 18 minutes.

Daniell, who runs out of the Mississauga Track Club, will next compete in the Star Trek, the 12-mile race sponsored by the Toronto Star. He competed in the event last year, the first time it was ever run. The Star Trek is run on the grounds of the Metro Zoo in Scarborough.

Mike Dixon, another Georgetown runner, is also expected to take part in the Star Trek.
