"OTTO" JELINEK FOR HALTON



THE MAN:

Born in Prague, Czechoslovakia, Otto Jelinek came to Halton with his parents when he was six years old.

His family established a business in Oakville with Otto attending Blakelock & Appleby College in town.

After he and his sister won the World Pairs Figure Skating Championship in 1962, Otto Jelinek returned to Oakville and established his own business, Canadian Skate Industries, which he operated successfully until his entry into Federal Politics in 1972, at which time he sold his business in order to devote his full time to public life.

In that year, Otto was asked by the Progressive Conservatives to contest the Toronto riding of High Park. He won, defeating the sitting Liberal member, and held his seat in the 1974 election, one of only two

Toronto members to do so.

During his seven years as a member of the House of Commons Otto has been a man of action. As an elected representative, Otto believes in speaking upon behalf of people.

He has done this forcefully and consistently on a variety of issues ranging from the support of free enterprise to the enforcement of law and order.

After Canada-wide Re-distribution, Otto's riding of High Park was dissolved, Otto saw the need for strong and effective representation in Ottawa for his home constituency of Halton.

His party members agreed by nominating Otto Jelinek for Halton at the largest nominallion convention in local history.

THE VOTERS ASK:

What are your plans for the economy?

The Progressive Conservative Party will adopt the following measures:

- An immediate program of job creation by reducing the personal tax load.
- Increase tax credits for research and development by Canadian companies.
- Index capital gains taxed against inflation.
- Allow for inflation in inventory accounting.
- Offer a special \$5,000 a year small business investment credit.
- Develop secondary manufacturing sector.
- Regulate growth policies by a program of long-term tax contracts with corporations investing in slow growth areas.

Where do you stand on National Unity?

National unity is important to Canadians. Canada cannot be allowed to disintegrate. A strong central government is essential and must cooperate with all provinces fairly and squarely.

One can and must demonstrate to every province that a good future is guaranteed within Canada. We must return to what made Canada great - people working, producing and growing.

Most importantly, we will rebuild the image and strength of the private sector so that individuals will reach out and build a stronger, united Canada.

What about the unemployment problem?

A Progressive Conservative government will bring down a new budget with major emphasis on private sector job creation, as well as a re-vamped Unemployment Insurance program.

- Cut Federal sales tax on certain products (for example, building materials) to stimulate demand and create jobs.
- Implement unemployment tax credit which will make the credit non taxable.
- In co-operation with the provinces, establish trade schools for young people and implement an apprentice program.

Explain the home ownership plan:

A Progressive Conservative government will implement a plan to give our economy a major stimulus by providing relief from high shelter costs for Canadians.

Such a program will create thousands of new jobs in the home building and home furnishings industries.

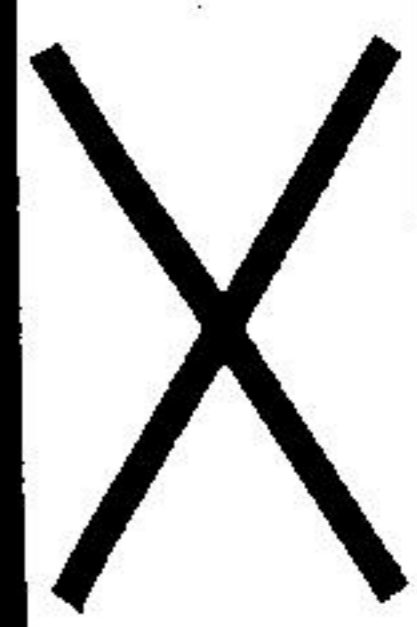
