A 21-year-old student from Georgetown in the Radio Broadcasting Program at Humber College in Toronto has won the 1979 Ruth Hancock Memorial scholarship.

Henriette Fokkens, of 19 McIntyre Crescent is the first student in the unique and extremely popular communications program at Humber to win the award which was established in 1975.

Miss Fokkens, an Ontario scholar while attending Georgetown District Secondary School, received the \$1,000 scholarship at the recent Canadian Association of Broadcasters convention in Toronto.

The scholarship was set up by the Broadcasters Executive Society and the CTV network in co-operation with CAB. Ms. Hancock was executive assistant to the president of the CTV and was manager of CAB's Toronto office for 12 years. She died in 1973.

Stewarttown bridge plans

A Milton construction firm has been awarded a \$154,000 tender to rebuild the Black Creek Bridge on Regional Road 15 (Sideroad 15) near Stewarttown.

Halton regional council last Wednesday accepted a public works committee recommendation naming Inverleigh Construction Ltd. as the lowest of eight bidders and authorizing the firm's hiring. Inverleigh, which has already done bridge reconstruction in Halton, was also the only local bidder.

For \$153,968.16, the company will reconstruct the dilapidated bridge on Regional Road 15 just east of Trafalgar Road. Regional council has already budgetted \$138,000 for the project and will draw the balance of \$40,000 from its \$570,000 reserve roads fund.

Acton Arts and Crafts president Jean Denny is serving her second term as president of the group. The organization has just passed its tenth anniversary and three of the eight members have been with it from the beginning.

Members meet the second Tuesday afternoon of each month in the Watson Room of the Acton library to discuss their work and learn about other crafts too via things like slide presentations and instruction from a member who has taken a course in a new craft. The members did block printing as a group one time, Mrs. Denny says, and last winter they all learned to quilt. They used to hold work meetings when the club was first set up but that is no longer the practise although members bring in completed works when they begin a new line in their craft so that everyone knows what the others are doing. They are not a teaching

group, Mrs. Denny says, but that doesn't mean they don't share ideas. They're just too small to run courses. Their members weave, work in leather and wood burning, ceramics, basketry, batik, painting and make porcelain. Membership fees are \$7.50 annually. The group belongs to the Halton Hills Arts Council and will be exhibiting at Summerfest and Back to Acton days. They also hold a show and sale the last Saturday in October in the Anglican church hall in Acton each year. They would welcome new members and Mrs. Denny hopes interested people would make themselves known to the group.

Mrs. Denny was born in England and emigrated to Canada with her husband Jack and her two sons in 1953. Their daughter was born after they moved to their home on the Fourth Line 18 years ago. As well as weaving and basketry Mrs. Denny does macramé. She is a member of the Georgetown Weavers Guild as well as a founding member of the Acton Arts and Crafts.
