JOHN BOYCE

As one of the veterans on the Georgetown Raiders' roster, Boyce came back to have one of his better seasons.

1977-78 was not a banner year for Boyce, but he worked to get in excellent physical condition for this past season and game in game out was the team's most consistent blueliner.

Although Boyce was plagued with injuries throughout the campaign, he played injured and made a great contribution to the team's excellent season.

For most of the playoffs Boyce had a broken ankle, but he did not let it stop him from dressing and seeing a semi-regular stub for most of the playoff games.

IAN CLARK

Clark began the season by wiping out the competition in various cross-country meets.

Competing in the junior age category he won the Haltons, Peel-Haltions, the OFSAA and then went on to take it all in the Canadian championship cross-country meet held in Vancouver.

In March Clark travelled to Limerick, Ireland to compete in the World cross-country championships taking fifth place among the world's best.

Last year at the OFSAA track and field championships Clark finished third in the junior 1,500 metres race and fourth in the 3,000.

This year in track and field Clark was an impressive winner in both those events at the Halton and Peel-Halton championships and is a favorite to take them at the OFSAA to be held next month.

HEATHER CLARKE

Clarke is another excellent all-round athlete at Georgetown district high school. She competes on the senior basketball, swimming, and track and field teams.

In basketball Clarke was a starting forward on the GDHS team which went to the Halton semi-finals.

In swimming Clarke had an outstanding year and made the most impressive showing among GDHS swimmers at the OFSAA championships with a seventh in the backstroke event. On the way to OFSAA she took several Halton and Peel-Halton titles.

In track and field Clarke has qualified for two events at the OFSAA Regional Qualifying meet tomorrow. At the Peel-Haltions she took thirds in the 100-metres hurdles and also the long jump.

DEBBIE DANARD

Debbie Danard, a student at the Northern Karate Club in Norval, took first place honors in either kata or sparring in 16 tournaments in the latter half of 1978 and so far in 1979.

Danard is a blue belt, but many of her championships have come in the open class where she competed against brown and black belts.

Her biggest wins were at the Ontario Open (kata), The Canadian Championships (kata), the Battle of Atlanta (kata), the United States Open (kata and sparring), Quebec Provincial Championships (sparring grand championships). She also took a third in kata at the Internationals in Long Beach, California in a tournament which features competitors from 16 countries.

BRIAN HAYWARD

After tending the nets for the Canadian Junior A tier two Centennial Cup champions Guelph Hobday Platers last season, Hayward earned an athletic scholarship to Cornell University in Ithaca, New York.

As a freshman Hayward earned Cornell's starting goaltending job and proceeded to have a great year.

He played in 24 of the teams games and had a very respectable 3.82 goals-against average. In the 24 games Hayward played at Cornell he had a record of 18

wins and six losses. He also had two shutouts in the high-scoring university loop. Cornell finished third in the ECAC playoffs, beating defending NCAA champion Boston University 7-4 in the consolation final.

Hayward's performance in his freshman year earned him a spot on the second all-star team of the 1979 all-Ivy squad.

Hayward was also chosen as the ECAC Goalie of the Week three times and was Rookie of the Weeks two weeks.

STACEY HURLEY

Stacey Hurley, at the tender age of 15, is one of the most promising young tennis players in the country.

In 1978 Hurley was ranked number six in Canada for female players 14 years of age and under and she won several tournaments.

One of her biggest victories last year was in the Ontario Open as she was a member of the Open Doubles Championship team.

She has kept up the pace this year and she has gone into the late rounds in many tournaments.

One of her most impressive showing came just this past weekend at the Invitational round-robin tournament. She was competing in the 18 and under category for the first time. She finished second in the tournament and along the way claimed victories over top-seeded Canadians.

JURI KUDRASOV

Kudrasovs was the scoring champion as a member of the OHA Intermediate "A" southern division as a member of the Georgetown Raiders.

Throughout the season Kudrasovs was undoubtedly one of the leaders of the Raiders, who had one of their most successful years in years.

In a season when many Raiders missed so many games, Kudrasovs was one of the players that could be counted on to be there and give it his best effort every time out.

STAN LORUSSO

Lorusso was on championship teams in two very different sports over the past winter.

He was a regular on the Halton Hills Tropics which won the Wellington-Dufferin-Simcoe non-contact hockey championship.

Lorusso was also the top bowler on the Halton Hillbillies, who won the league championship in the Brampton Men's Major 10-pin Bowling League.

Lorusso had the high average (without handicap) in the league with a 174. He also had the high triple (again without handicap) with a 620.

Last May Lorusso competed in the Ontario Provincial 10-pin tournament and out of approximately 1,000 bowlers he finished second, missing the championship by a mere three pins.

MEREDITH McLAREN
McLaren is the only athlete nominated who has competed for both Acton and Georgetown this past season.

McLaren, a senior, began the season at Georgetown district high school. There she was a starter in basketball and one of the leading scorers on the Georgetown team.

In mid-year McLaren transferred to Acton high and she is a member of that school's track and field team.

Two weeks ago McLaren broke the meet record at the Halton championships in the 100-metres hurdles event. She covered the distance in a time of 15.9 seconds.

Last week McLaren finished second to Olympian Julie White in the same event to earn a berth for the OFSAA Qualifying meet to be held in Niagara Falls tomorrow.

GORDON MILLER

Miller was the youngest player to attend the training camp of the Toronto Blizzard Soccer Club this past spring. Although the Blizzard eventually went with few homebrews, choosing instead to go with players from all over the world, Miller was one of the last players the squad let go. He is still on the team's negotiation list and will be playing for one of its farm teams.

Miller is also one of the finest athletes at Georgetown district high school.

He quarterbacked the senior football Rebels and led them to the playoffs, after a weak season in 1977. He was the ball-controlling guard on the basketball team and also was a member of the track and field team.

KEVIN PARKER

Parker completed an excellent junior career by finishing second at the Canadian Figure Skating Championships in Thunder Bay.

En route to the Canadians Parker, an Acton high school senior, won the Sectionals and also took it all in the Mid-Western Canadians.

Parker's most impressive victory may have come in the Sectionals. In that competition Parker was not at his best in the first two rounds.

Going into the free-skate portion of the program he was in third place. He skated a very strong program to score very high marks and take the crown.

BILL PICKELLS

Pickells, who instructs at the Northern Karate Club in Norval, is at present the most travelled and certainly one of the most successful martial artists in Canada. He specializes in kata, in which a martial artist shows his command of form, and has taken numerous tournament championships over the past year.

Just some of the major tournaments he won the black belt champions in were the Labatt's Tournament of Champions, American International Karate championships, the Ontario Provincials, and the United States Open. He was second at the United States Open and mid-Americans.

Late in 1978 Pickells was also the only Canadian invited to compete in an international tournament in Venezuela and finished second in a tournament which saw top competitors come from 14 countries.

MONICA POLLOCK

One would be hard pressed to find a more active and diversified athlete than Monica Pollock.

The senior at Georgetown district high school competes in four sports at the high school. She was a member of the basketball team that went to the Halton semi-final, and also on the volleyball, badminton and track and field sports.

In the track and field she has qualified for two events

in the OFSAA Qualifying meet to be held tomorrow at Niagara Falls.

Pollock is also a stalwart performer for the Georgetown Legion Royalettes. She plays third base for the Royalettes and bats second in the lineup.

Pollock's athletic participation is not only in the competitive end of things. She is also the first female referee in the Georgetown Minor Hockey Association and an umpire in baseball and softball during the summer.

PETER STURGEON

Sturgeon joined the Georgetown Raiders Intermediate "A" Hockey Club midway through this past year and quickly established himself as one of the finest hockey players in the loop.

Sturgeon, who in 1974 was a third-round draft choice of the Boston Bruins, averaged more than a point a game in his stint with the Raiders and was a driving force in the Raiders winning the OHA Intermediate "A" championship.

The main facet of Sturgeon's play which helped the Raiders was his versatility. Coach Gerry Inglis used him on defense, centre and both wings.

The big former pro also scored some of the classiest goals seen in the league this year and his tough and belligerent play made him a favorite with the Raider fans.

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Swimmer a winner

There were six schools from Mississauga and Oakville as well as Sunshine school where Amanda attends to compete in several different swimming events.


Amanda, 18, will now qualify for the All-Ontario special swimming meet at the Etobicoke Olympian next week.
