Hutchinson quickly established himself as an enforcer with the Kings as in his first year he picked up 133 penalty minutes. One year he had 220 minutes. He stayed with the Kings until he was traded to Toronto.

While in Los Angeles Hutchinson was a constant foe of the Leafs' Dave "Tiger" Williams. The two players had what could have been a very grim stick-fighting duel and each received severe suspensions.

Of his fights with Williams Hutchinson once said, "We'll probably have fights every time our teams play each other because we're both too stupid to stop." Such is life in pro hockey that Williams and Hutchinson became good friends once they became teammates.

The Ontario Ministry of Health provides vaccines to immunize children against polio, diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, measles, mumps and rubella (German measles).

These vaccines are free, and your Ontario Health Insurance Plan (OHIP) pays a fee to the doctor for administering them to your child.

If you have children 2 months or over, make sure they're protected. Take them

to your family physician now, or have them immunized by your local health unit. And while you're there, find out if you need a booster shot yourself.

It takes more than one visit to have your child immunized completely. To help you remember when to take your child back to the doctor we've prepared a handy pamphlet. It will tell you which diseases your children should be immunized against and at what ages.
