A remedy is urgently required - how quickly will

the authorities move? in the past 11 years of soccer the numbers have grown from 127 registrations in 1968 to well in excess of 1000 in 1979.

Youth soccer, over 850 registered, with a welcome increase in girls, leads the

way.
If there were no outlet for these kids is there any appreciation of the boredom of much reduced activity, the cessation of moving towards physical in all round summer fitness, assisting in the menal and physical growth, transfer of possible vandalism directed energy to better use and I do not suggest that summer recreational activities are otherwise vandals.

We present, in conjunction with other ball sports and other activities, fairly well orgaized and skilfull outlets for the youth, andadults, of the area - voluntarily, I find that demands from the authorities on our time, labour and financial structures are on the increase - and they

should consider very carefully their direction. I can see the day when the soccer portfolio is put firmly on the recreation department deak and told "You do it".

And so, referring back to the opening remarks, those fields in need of repair and regular maintenance, should have had attention and need it now. More fields should have been provided and must be - now.

"I am still hoping to catch on in some capcity with an National hockey league " team," Schooley said. "I'm going to wait until the draft meetings in late June before marking any plans."


