## Daniell wins at Star Trek

Georgetown's Bob Daniell did not match his time of last year, but he was still an easy winner in the Masters Men division of the Star Trek run at the Toronto Metropolitan Zoo Sunday.

Daniell covered the 20-kilometre (12.5 miles) in a time of one hour, 10 minutes and three seconds, which was just one second more than he ran the race last year.

The race was run in sweltering heat, but Daniell, an experienced marathoner, said the heat did not bother him.

The closest Masters (40 years or older) runner to Daniell was Harry Braksman of Toronto, who was three minutes and 17 seconds behind the Georgelown runner.

## SECOND

Bruce McIntyre of Georgetown also had an excellent race as his one hour, nine minutes and 42.4 seconds was good enough to take second place in the junior men category.

Unlike Daniell, McIntyre, who last year competed for the Georgetown district high school Hebels, is not used to running long distances.

Previous to the Trek, sponsored by the Sunday Star, the longest distance McIntyre had ever run was to kilometres, or half the distance.

"My goal before the race was to finish it under an hour and 10 minutes." McIntyre told The Herald. "Since I had not run anywhere near that distance before I had no idea on how to pace myself."

McIntyre's time is even more impressive when it is considered that he has not run competitively in eight months.

Unlike Daniell, McIntyre was affected by the heat. He also had very sore feet at the end of the race.

Finishing first in the junior mens was Ancaster's Douglas Orr. He finished 52 sesecond ahead of McIntyre.

Halton Hills councillors
Marilyn Serjeantson also ran
in the Trek and posted a very
respectable time of one hour,
45 minutes and 10 seconds.
She was thirty-eighth among
the women.

Daniell, 40, was coming off a second place showing at the Capital Marathon held in Ottawa two weeks ago.

In the Trek Daniell averaged just over five and half minutes a mile. McIntyre was approximately the same. For the just over 26 miles in Ottawa he was just under six minutes a mile.
