Lorusso wins Harrison award

The team's executive members all have a vote on who should receive the trophy.

Lorusso, whose main function with the team is as chairman of the Booster Club committee, was obviously a very popular choice. As he walked up to recieve his trophy and plaque the approximate 175 people in attendance gave him a standing ovation.


