

# Ian Clark wins two events at Regionals

Ian Clark continued his surge to the OFSAA track and field meet with victories in the 1,500 and 3,000 metres races at the Regionals held in Niagara Falls last Thursday. Clark, a junior, will lead a Rebel contingent of seven to

the OFSAA meet to be held this weekend. The runners' most impressive showing was made in the 1,500 race as he covered the distance in 3:52.2, the fastest time he has ever recorded for the event.

His time for the 3,000 metres was 8:29.2, the fastest time he has had outdoors so far this season. However, it is still not close to the 8:04 he had indoors to break the Canadian Junior record.

### SAME DAY

The 1,500 and 3,000 at the Regionals were run on the same day, with the 3,000 being the second. At the OFSAA the two events will be run on separate days.

Jon Lancaster, who ran second to Clark in the two events at the Haltons and Peel-Haltons, finished second in the 3,000, but could only manage a fourth in the 1,500. He will run in both events at OFSAA.

Lancaster's time for the 3,000 was 8:55.9. His time for the 1,500 was 4:09.1. At the Peel-Haltons his time for the latter event was seven seconds faster.

Midget girls Sherry Finucan will run in two events at OFSAA. Her 4:53.3 was good enough to take third place in the 1,500 and the 800 she took fifth in a very tight race with a 2:24.8.

### CLOSE RACE

One of the closest races of the day was the junior boys' 800 metres. In that one Doug Smith had an excellent time of 1:58.6 and finished fourth. The winning time in the event was 1:57.1. Smith also ran the 400, but did not qualify.

In the senior division Arnold Brakel, who is still junior age, qualified for the 1,500 at OFSAA with a time of 4:08.9. He also ran the 3,000 but did not qualify.

Andrew Brakel ran a 4:21.5, 1,500 to qualify in that event for midgets. He also ran the 3,000 and finished sixth.

The final Rebel to qualify was midget Mickey Rich-

mond in the girls' javelin. She threw the javelin 29.32 metres to take a third. A toss of 32.23 metres won the event.

Eight other Rebels competed at the Regionals, but did not qualify for OFSAA.

Junior Heather Reed was sixth in the 3,000 and eighth in the 1,500.

Senior Heather Clarke finished first in her 100-metres hurdles heat, but her sixth best time in the event was not enough to qualify her for OFSAA. Clarke also competed in the long jump.

John Warnock also competed in the two events. The junior aged competitors times in the 800 and 1,500 were not good enough to qualify in the senior division.

### JUST MISSED

Fergus Barnes, just missed qualifying in the open boys' steeplechase, finishing sixth. In the same event Dale MacGregor was eighth.

Diane Jones ran seventh in the junior girls' 3,000 metre event and Susan Kristenson competed in the same event for seniors.

The Rebels only chance to take a high place in a division at OFSAA will be in the junior boys'. If Clark can win 1,500 and 3,000 races, Lancaster finished somewhere in the top four or five in both events and Smith ran a strong 800 they could pile up points.

At last year's provincial meet the Rebels had only Smith and sprinter Brian Davis in the midget division. The two runners did well enough in their events to give the Rebels second place in the division.

Smith was the only Rebel to claim an OFSAA gold medal last year when he won the 800.

## Royalettes take tourney

In the next game against Iberton Debbie Shortt took over in the pitching circle and she was just as effective as Wilkes. Shortt struck out four batters, walked two and scattered three hits.

Noreen Atkinson carried a big bat and also made a couple of circus catches to star for the Royalettes in this one. In the fourth inning, with the bases full, Atkinson hit a long double to clear the bases and send the Royalettes on their way.

Gies, Pat White and Nancy Shortill had two hits each for the winners, with Monica Pollock collecting two. Joey Bennett and Barb Curry had one each.

In the next game, which was on Sunday, the Royalettes drew Tonawanda 1-1. There was an hour and a half curfew in the games.
