Regional policies

Story annoys councillors

seems to be to want to attract better than average type residential construction, possibly because the politicians feel they'll get a better type of citizen," he said.

"Councils of the past were prepared to acknowledge the theoretical need for diversity in housing but were reluctant to accept the policies which would have changed things much less provide leadership in developing co-operation between the planning and development approach to the problem," he said.

The article quotes Cumming as saying that "even where smaller housing is permitted, the builder-developer puts up bigger houses."

"I expect there's a lot more

money in expensive singles than in less expensive singles, semis, and multiples," he continued. "Maybe we should be stating the maximum house size that can be put on a lot rather than the minimum."

Mr. Cumming said that until the region is prepared to tell each of the four area municipalities that it is responsible for so much of a certain type of housing nothing will be done to change the situation and so far this hasn't happened. In other words the region would tell each municipality it needed so many rental units, so many semis, so many less expensive single units and so on. But it would be up to the municipality to decide where to place each of these types of housing.

"It would be up to the specific municipality to work this into the fabric of the community properly," he said. "These types of housing should be integrated rather than segregated but without being glaringly incompatible."

RIDICULOUS ARTICLE
Halton Hills mayor, Pete Pomeroy, termed the story "one of the most ridiculous articles I've seen in my life."

The suggestion that the region wants only "classier" industries he said, was "absolutely incorrect."

"Halton Hills might have a problem servicing certain industries but the region wants

any kinds of industry it can get provided it's environmentally sound," he said.

Halton's business development officer William Marshall agreed "only a few particularly obnoxious industries" such as a new oil refinery or an abattoir would not be "really welcome" in Halton.

"Some industries might require a particularly skilled type of labour which isn't available in Halton," he said, "but I don't know any industry that wouldn't be welcome."

Mayor Pomeroy said that social services are a fairly new idea and so long as the government funds it the demand will grow. "I suppose a lot of people deserve this help," he said, "but the trouble with any group like this that's formed to fulfill a need is that it becomes overrun with bureaucrats."

The article takes a slap at the haphazard funding of emergency services noting Georgetown has an "all-volunteer ambulance service" and volunteer firefighting services exist in several areas including Halton Hills.

Mayor Pomeroy defended Halton Hill's volunteers and said he would guarantee better quality service from our volunteer ambulance people and volunteer fire fighters than

from any full time, fully paid emergency service anywhere because volunteers are always more dedicated than paid employees.

Mr. Booth also took exception to a statement in the article indicating that internal jealousies are tearing apart the whole fabric of regional government in Peel, Halton, York and Durham.

"In my opinion there's no jealousy whatsoever between Halton and Peel and Halton and Hamilton-Wentworth or any of the surrounding municipalities, except in the minds of the few who want to destroy regional government," he said. "Halton has its own identity and its councillors are proud to belong to it."

"According to all the evidence available to me, the members of Halton Hills and Halton regional councils and all the other regional councils and the province the financial base of a regional government is far superior and sounder than that of a county and small municipalities."

Mr. Booth said that while the region may be experiencing problems at this point these will disappear with the passage of time and "the advantages will far outweigh the problems in the future."
