## Ian Clark takes two golds

lan Clark only led the 1,500 and 3,000 metres events for short spans of time in the OFSAA Track and Field Championships, but they were at the right times as he ended up with two gold medals.

Clark used a kick which was not evident last year to win both the events at the all-Ontario championship held at Etobicoke Centennial Park last Friday and Satur-

weather was perfect for the racers.

SETPACE

Clark let Dennis Stark of Quinte set the pace for the race. The Belleville runner, who has been Clark's main adversary for several years now held the lead for two and a half of the three laps.

Stark relinguished the lead until approximately 300 metres remained in the race and he again took over the top

At the top of the stretch it was Stark still in the lead with Clark right on his shoulder. Clark took over the lead with for the first time with only 15 yards left. He crossed the finish line a yard ahead of Stark.

"I did not have any particular strategy going into the race," Clark said. "I had decided that if the pace was fast enough I would hang in third of fourth spot."
The time for Clark in the

event was 3:52.2 which will stand as a new record for the meet. It tied the time Clark had at the qualifying meet in Niagara Falls the week before.

"I was surprised when I heard the time was that good," Clark said. "The pace did not seem to be all that fast to me."

It was Clark's inability to out kick Stark that cost him third place at last year's OFSAA meet. "That was about the first time I have been successful in outkicking Stark," Clark sald. The Georgetown runner is much bigger physically than he was at last year's OFSAA meet in Kingston.

SAME STORY It was basically the same story in the 3,000 metres event held the next day, except the conditions and Clark's main competitor

were different. This race was run in mid-afternoon and the heat was stifling. Clark said he felt "lousy" before the race began but he figured most of the other runners felt the

same way. Dave Reid of West Humber in Toronto was Clark's main challenger in this event. Reid had qualified for the 1,500 but he passed on it to save himself for the 3,000, a race he figured to do better at.

Reid set the pace for much of the early part of the race, relinguishing briefly to a slew of other runners. Again Clark was content to hang in third of fourth spot for the majority of the race.

Going into the last straightaway Clark took the lead for the first time crossing the
