Alarms changing

The Georgetown area is slated for an expansion of its central alarm service with a new technique enabling several alarms to be transmitted over the same line at once.

ADT Security, which supplies security and fire alarm systems, will be installing a new system called ContraScan 85 to operate in Georgetown. This system "significantly increases the range and efficiency of ADT's central alarm stations. Georgetown is one of the first areas in Canada served by us to benefit from ContraScan," ADT president Ronald Thornley said.

The main part of the ContraScan system is a console containing computer system components. One of these components is a new unit which will allow more than one signal to be sent over the same wire at the same time, instead of using the old technique of using an

individual transmission line from each alarm to the station. Transmission lines are becoming more difficult to get, and their range is limited to 10 miles, Mr. Thornley said.

The new system will automatically display alarms coming in, with a priority assigned to the calls on the basis of life-threatening situations receiving first priority.

By using a code number for the location where the alarm signal is coming from, security supervisors can retrieve information from the computer giving the address of the location, the telephone numbers of police and fire departments serving the area, telephone numbers of responsible individuals such as the owner or manager, and information about the presence of flammable or volatile substances, and the location of water supply standpipes.
