In one of the most exciting!
games of the year the

Friday night.

The game featured all the excitement of the George-town Raiders' international games against Yugoslavia and Austria. The missing ingredient was the electricity added by 1,500 fans. There were only approximately 300 at the arena Friday night.

The fans who did make it out saw a very hard-fought battle between the two teams with the outcome in doubt until the final buzzer ran.

TOP PLAYER

They also saw one of the top young players in Sweden at his best. Stefan Persson, almost 17, treated the audience to a great show.

The Swedes, although they had a full bench, went almost exclusively with two lines with Persson occassionally being double shifted.

Georgetown coach Nell Cotton used his whole lineup for the first two periods and went with two lines in the third period.

With just less than two minutes remaining in the fist period Hagsfor went up 2-0 with Stefan Persson scoring his first of the night from Per Schyan and Goran Eriksson.

It did not take Georgetown much of the second period to get back to within one goal. Withouty 25 seconds gone Bob Dean put them on the board on a play set up by Dave Pilote.

Hagsfor went up by two goals again just over two minutes later. Stogren got his second from Stefan Persson and Goran Eriksson.

Georgetown tied the score before the second period was over. Mark Hamilton scored the second Georgetown goal from Tom Simpson and the notcher was tallied by Simpson from John Thorpe and Bill Wheeler.

The Swedes, like their younger compatriates who'd played earlier had to be tired in this game. They too made the six-hour bus ride from Ottawa in the morning. To add to their fatigue was the fact the coach only went with two lines.

However, they came out in the third period and played their hearts out. The Georgetown players, who had been tenacious throughout the contest, also came out flying for the third period shootout.

Stefan Persson scored the classiest and prettiest goal of the night early in the frame to put the Swedes back in front. The winger showed great puck control in maneveuring around two Swedes and then he snapped a shot by Beckett. Eriksson set him on his way.

BACK EVEN

Dan Reynolds got Georgetown back even when scored with 6:34 left in the game. Wheeler and captain Herb Kewley set up the goal, that goal opened the floodgate as within the next three minutes, four more goals were scored.

Mark Bingham scored at the 8:01 mark to put the homeside in front for the first time in the contest. Dean and Kevin Thompson set up the goal.

Stefan Perrson completed his hat trick less than a minute later and the visitors were back in front. Erikson and Eisenbiesser set him up.

Less than a minute after the Persson goal, Hagsfor jumped ahead again in the seesaw battle as Nilsson scored from Lars Berg and Thomas Petterson.

Selecting a Most Valuable Player for the Swedes was not too difficult. Stefan Persson controlled the play in almost every shift he took.

On the Georgetown side Reynolds was chosen the MVP. The little winger had three points and they all came in the third period when the game was up for grabs.

Beckett, although he was beaten six times, played a very strong game in the Georgetown net. He played a gambling type game, leaving his crease area on many occasions, and came up with some very good acrobatic saves.

Young Hamilton also played a very strong game. Although in many cases he was much smaller than the opponent facing him it never detered him from going into the corners to get the puck.

After the game Cotton said most of his players were very nervous before the game,

"They had an awful case of the butterflies," the coach said. "But once the game started they settled down and really played well."

The Swedes played more of a North American brand of hockey than many of the fans expected. They took the body in on many occasions and fired the puck quickly. Person had one very European tactic.
