Six-hour ride

Georgetown juniors triumph over tired Sweden squad

The Georgetown Junior hockey team had little trouble in defeating a tired visiting Swedish team 10-1 at Alcott Arena Friday night,

The young Swedes had travelled six hours in a bus during the day and the wear and tear of the trip showed most on their defensemen who gave goaltender Peter Johansson little support.

To add to the Swedes' problems they had not been on ice to practise for nearly a month and they were also asked to tackle a Georgetown team which is one of the best in the Rep system. The Major Bantams, who made up most of the Georgetown team, went three rounds into the OMHA playdowns and also went the same number of rounds in the Georgetown International Bantam Tournament before being ellminated.

NOTLONG

It did not take long for the Georgetown outfit to get on the scoreboard. Thirtyeight seconds after the opening faceoff Dave Doucette, one of three minor bantams in the lineup, tallied with Rivy Kennedy and Eric Clark, another minor bantam, drawing the assists.

Before the first period was six minutes old the Georgetown team really put the Swedes behind the eight ball as they scored three more goals.

David Norton got the second goal with Mike Doucette and Anthony Oram assisting. Mike Doucette made it 3-0 on a play set up by his brother Dave and Geordie Adams. The fourth Georgetown goal came off the stick of Bobby Morrow with Paul White drawing the assist.

Although Georgetown had many more good scoring opportunities in the remainder of the first period they could not get the puck behind Johansson. The little netminder was superb as in many occasions he was left to fend for himself.

Georgetown left little doubt of the outcome of the game when they tallied twice early in the second period. Clark, who played an excellent game on the wing, got the first one with White and Mike Doucette assisting.

White made it 5-0 Georgetown 2:03 into the middle frame and only 39 seconds after the Clark goal, when he tallied from Peter Haller and Morrow.

Oram scored Georgetown's final goal of the second period with 2:47 remaining on the clock with Haller and Blake Harrison. the third minor bantam in the lineup, assisting.

NO SHOTS

There were no official shots on net statistics kept in the game. However, Ian Ward a member of the Swe-

den '79 committee, said he was keeping tabs on the shots and that Johansson faced 34 in the first two periods.

In the third period, with the game out of reach and also being very tired, the Swedes just appeared to go through the motions.

Ken Ward made it a 7-0 game only 13 seconds into the period with Kennedy setting him up. Clark scored two goals in the middle of the period to complete his hat trick in International play. Norton got assists on two of the goals and Haller, with his third, and Oram, with his second, also had assists on the play.

With 25 seconds left in the game the Swedes finally got on the scoreboard and received a big ovation from the Georgetown crowd.

Roger Larsson scored the goal with Mikael Johansson and Mikael Johanssen (that's no typo folks) assist-

Morrow, who played a tough and aggressive game, was chosen as the most valuable player on the Georgetown side.

LOTS OF STARS

Of course in a 10-1 game it was not easy to pick out an outstanding player on the Georgelown side. Almost everyone in the lineup stood out, Clark, Haller, Oram and Mike Doucette had especially strong games.
