# Way-Jays lose game and pitcher Jeff Haines

The Glen Williams Way-Jays lost an Intercounty Fastball League game last Tuesday, but more importantly they may have lost the services of pitcher Jeff Haines who had been having a great year.

Haines took batting practice before the scheduled game against Cambridge and during it he tore some muscles in his shoulder. The pitcher still started the game, but he was tagged pretty good and in favor of his younger brother Terry with none out in the fourth inning.

**WON'T PITCH**

Manager John Haines said

the extent of the injury is not known, but that he did not expect Jeff to throw in any of the team's games this week.

Cambridge ended up winning the ball game 3-1, handing the Way-Jays their second straight defeat.

Haines did not show any effects from the shoulder injury in the first inning as he struck out the side.

R. Rose matched Haines as the Cambridge pitcher also struck out the side in the first inning.

John Harsely tagged Haines for a home run with one out in the second inning to put his club on the board. Later that inning Haines also gave up a double, but he

managed to get out of the frame with no more runs scored against him.

In the third inning two hits and an error accounted for another Cambridge run. When B. Miller took Haines over the fence with none out in the fourth, manager Haines decided to pull his starting pitcher.

**REMARKABLE**

Terry Haines then came in and for the last six innings he was remarkable. The young hurler only allowed three hits, all singles, and walked none. No Cambridge runner got as far as second base against Terry Haines.

Meanwhile the Way-Jay hitters were again having

trouble getting good wood on the ball. And when they did get some hits, they could not bring the runners around.

In the second inning Joe South and Jackie Bergman both hit singles, but they were stranded at second and third respectively.

In the fourth Dean Hancock, on an error, and South, with his second single got on base. However Hancock was thrown out trying to take third base on South's hit to end the inning.

In the fifth the Way-Jays got one of the three runs back when Bergmann, who had been hit by a pitch, scored on Bert Osborne's single.

The Way-Jays had

three runners on in the sixth but scored none. In the seventh and eighth they had three more potential runs reach base, but again they could not bring them around. Three Way-Jays players, were thrown out on the base paths during the game.

**TOO MANY LEFT**

We left too many runners on base, manager Haines said. You can't win many games when you don't get the runs across.

The manager thinks that the Way-Jays hitting problems have been caused by inactivity. The Way-Jays have only played 12 games due to rain outs.

"I think our bats will get going when we get more games in," Haines said. "But we have been playing about one game a week and it is hard for the players to get their timing down."

The Way Jays will be a very busy club this week. They played at home against Belwood last night, travel to Orangeville tomorrow night and playe two here against Rockwood Sunday. Haines figures the activity will get the bats going.

As for his pitching problems with his son injured, Haines said he will try to get Moe Curtis to toss a couple of the games Curtis has appeared in one game so far this year.
