Renaissance head challenges board director

Rev. Ken Campbell, president of Renalssance International, has challenged Halton board of education chairman Bill Herd to appear with him in public to repeat a statement attributed to the chairman in an Oakville newspaper that "Rev. Campbell should mind his own bloody business."

Renaissance International, an organization devoted to the encouragement of the teaching of Judeo-Christian morality and values in the public school system, has been keeping a relatively low profile in recent months, but has "come out of the closet", as Rev. Campbell described it, to attack the board's handling of the publication of an underground newspaper, called Rag-Laf-Art, at Oakville-Trafalgar' High School.

The newspaper, whose name is Trafalgar, spelt backwards, depicted teachers performing bodity functions and sexual perversions. Four of the students responsible for the publication will be suspended for a portion of the coming school

BLAMES OFFICIALS

Rev. Campbell has said the administration and not the students, is ultimately responsible for the publication of Rag-Laf-Art. Rev. Campbell blames the "anti-parent, selfserving" school officials who have been advocating "antiauthoritarian, moral and sexual permissiveness" in the classroom for the conditions which encouraged the publica-

tion of the newspaper. Mr. Herd's response to Mr. Campbell's comments was to say Rev. Campbell should "mind his own bloody business" and "stop taking pot shots from his mountain". Elther that or he should run for a seat on the board himself, the chairman said.

Rev. Campbell asked the board chairman to appear with him at a public meeting and repeat his statement, "together with an explanation as to why the concerns which prompted this letter, and indeed, which shook me from parental apathy five years ago, are not my blessed business as a fath-

er and taxpaying resident for

21 years in the Halton region."

He suggested the two meet on the platform at the Emmanuel Baptist Church in Milton Sunday evening, July 22. If Mr. Herd did not agree to the meeting, Rev. Campbell said, his only "honorable" course, would be to resign as chair-

Mr. Herd said at the board meeting Thursday that he did not plan to meet with Rev. Campbell, but that he would be replying by letter. Oakville trustee Elsie Hilson asked if the board would be receiving a copy of his response. Mr. Herd said this is not usually done, but he would make sure she received a copy if she wished.

Underwater Bermuda

HAMILTON, Bermuda . It's like a chapter of "Twenty Thousand Leagues Under the Sea", but with a few notic-" able differences. The fictional submarine Nauthus, for instance, has been replaced by a special rigged 53-foot surface launch called Carloca, and the man in charge in charge is not the bearded Captain Nemo but a clean shaven Bermudian named Bronson Hartley.

Most everything else. though, is reminiscent of Jules Vern's classic tale; the bell-shaped diving helmet with the little windows; the slow-motion sensation brought on by moving through a liquid environment; then, there's the reef with its countless marine animals of all types and colours, including the fish that unasbashedly gather to feed right out of your hand.

Hartley, who has been taking visitors on underwater strolls (\$20 per four-hour trip) for the last 31 years, spends nearly a third of his working day (June through



HAMILTON, Bermuda - Completely ringed by coral and algal reefs. Bermuda offers every visitor the chance to view the magnificent world found beneath the waves. Two visiting snorklers are seen passing over a shallow reef top that lies about six miles off the island's north-western tip. More than 20 species of hard and soft corals thrive in Bermuda waters and the reel system is the world's northernmost. Marine animals and fish of all sizes and descriptions live on the reefs which through the years have become a graveyard for more than 350 ships.



The most pleasurable way to celebrate "The Year of the Rose" is by arranging a bunch and displaying them prominently in your home.

For simple arrangements a dozen roses and six to 18 sprigs of foliage are ample. If largeleafed foliage is used, even fewer sprigs are needed.

Blossoms of different colors may be used and mixed with other flowers such as daisies. Simple containers such as coffee pots enhance the casual

Formal arrangements in stately vases call for tuses of one color supplemented with simple foliage such as lemon leaf, rhododendron or asparagus fern. All of these decorative foliages are widely

available at florist shops. Regardless of the type of arrangement you have in mind, begin by conditioning your flowers to ensure that they will

When you're ready to arrange, first decide the overall shape of the design. Ovals, circles and triangles provide good points of departure. Or, you might prefer a pincushion or fan shape.

If large-leaved foliage is to be used, begin by placing the foliage so that it makes an attractive collar around the neck of the vase. Fine foliage should be added later.

Select the tallest rose with the best shaped bud and place it as the focal point in your arrangement. Next, add the other toses and sprigs of foliage around them, following the shape you have chosen.




