

Big seventh inning rally gives Team 'B' 9-4 victory

FIGHTING HEAT

In the top of the first inning Barry James walked to lead off for the "B" team and he later came around to score on an error by centrefielder

Doug Anderson, who has one of the surest gloves in the league. It was only the first of many errors in the game, as the players were obviously fighting the heat and intense sun as much as their opposition.

The "A" team came back to score three runs in the bottom of the first inning as they sent eight men to the plate in the frame.

"B" team hurler Danny Engelby had trouble finding the plate in the first inning. He walked three batters to get himself into hot water. Bill Ruthledge, Bruce Spear

and Norm Topping scored the runs. They proved to be all the runs the "B" team was to allow.

The "B" team slowly began to chip away at the lead while their pitching settled down. In the second inning Engelby scored a run to make it a one-run difference.

In the sixth inning Bill Yakimishyn crossed the plate to finally get the "B" team even.

And then came the explosive seventh inning when the "A" team could not stop the flood of runs.

Bob Marchand, Chris Tennant, Yakimishyn, Arnie Lefebvre and Wally Williams all scored to give the "B" team the big lead.

Vince Lefebvre, who pitched excellent ball during his three-inning stint, was the winner of the game.

Dick Spear, of Acton, was handed the loss.

The most valuable player for the "B" team was Yakimishyn while the honor for the "A" squad went to Hornby's Frank Robinson. The two players received athletic bags which were donated by Molson's Breweries.

After Danny Engelby retired the Milton side in order in the top of the first, Georgetown scored four runs in their half of the frame.

Bill Routledge, Terry Masales, Wayne Farrow and Gord Stanbridge all scored runs. Chris Tennant, who had singled, was cut down at third base or Georgetown could have had a bigger rally.

In the top of the third Doug

Naylor scored for Milton to get them on the board. Tennant got that run right back as he led off the bottom of the frame with a round-tripper over the left field fence.

Tennant was the star in the early going as aside from his single and homer he also made a couple of fine defensive plays.

Milton kept fighting back and they got two runs back in the fourth when Ray Evans and Glen Turner scored.

THREATENED

The score remained 5-3 until the top of the sixth when Milton again threatened.

Bruce Chinnery scored a run to make it a one-run ball game. Georgetown's Doug Anderson and Al Denmore then combined to make an excellent defensive play to keep their team on top. Ed Dunn attempted to score on Don Hearn's single, but Anderson's throw from right field was right on the money and catcher Denmore did a great job of blocking the plate. That play seemed to give Georgetown the momentum again.

In the bottom of the sixth Georgetown began to pull ahead. The big blow in that inning was Keith McKinnon's

two-run shot over the left field fence. Al Moore had scored a run earlier in the frame.

Doug Anderson led off the bottom of the seventh with a solo shot, also over the left field fence, and Georgetown had the 9-4.

PITCHING SHARP

Engleby, Norm Topping and McKinnon were all very sharp in the pitching circle with each going three innings.

McKinnon had an outstanding game. He allowed just one hit, a single, and aside from his homer he also hit a hard line drive single.

For his outstanding play McKinnon was selected as Georgetown's Most Valuable Player and received a silver stein donated from Molson's Breweries. First baseman Evans, who got on base twice, was selected as Milton's MVP.

As previously mentioned there was a big turnout for the game. The support from both the Georgetown and Milton fans, had a very positive effect on the ball players as they played with much intensity and spirit. It should be one of the high points of the fastball season for years to come.

Local charity big benefactor
