Glen resident dies in hospital

Former Glen Williams resident George McNally died in Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital on August 2. He was 68.

Mr. McNally, the son of James McNally and Mary Kaley, was born in Glen Williams and spent his life there until he moved to Halton Centennial Manor in Milton in October 1978.

He retired in 1977 after 40 years with the Beaumont Knitting Mills in Glen Williams and Georgetown.

Mr. McNally was very athletic and played baseball for many years with Glen Williams teams.

He was a member of St. Alban's Anglican Church, Glen Williams.

He leaves two sisters, Margaret (Mrs. Harold Bennett) and Anne (Mrs. Walter Hyde) both of Georgetown and nine nieces and nephews. He was predeceased by his wife, the former Marian Cuff in 1973 and two sisters, Jennie McNally in 1968 and Mabel (Mrs. Robert Cain) in 1977 both of Glen Williams.

Funeral services were conducted from the McClure-Jones Funeral Home on Aug. 5 with interment following in Glen Williams cemetery.

Pallbearers were Hugh McNally, Harold Inglis, Gordon Graham, Donald Hancock, Bill McNally and Trevor Williams.

The Master of Credit Masonic Lodge No. 219, Jim Bingham, has worked his way up through the various offices over the past 10 years.

"Lodge members meet at the Masonic Temple on Highway Seven the second Wednesday of each month from September to June. The lodge has approximately 240 members. Annual dues are \$25 but there is a separate initiation fee for brand new members. The lodge is a fraternal organization. Members support local charities and also support charities through the Grand Lodge in Hamilton. Last year the Grand lodge donated a mobile blood van and this year a half million dollar trust fund was set up so that the interest could be used for research into hearing problems through the Toronto General Hospital.

Mr. Bingham, his wife Agnes, and their two daughters live on Gower Road. Mr. Bingham came to Canada from Glasgow 23 years ago and has lived in Georgetown for 18 years. He works for Ontario Hydro. He finds lodge work taking up much of his free time but he does enjoy curling, gardening and doing handyman jobs around home.

Veteran dies at 80

A long time Norval resident, Clifton William Moreton, M.M., died July 26 in Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital. He was 80.

Staff Sergeant Moreton was born in Winchester, Hampshire, England and began his involvement with the military at the age of 11 when he joined the Peter Symonds School Cadet Corps. He joined the battery of the Hampshire Regiment when he was 15.

In 1917 he was sent to Mesopotamia where he was awarded the Military Medal for bravery in the Arab Rebellion. He was the youngest sergeant in the Royal Engineers.

He settled in Norval in March 1921 and has lived there ever since. He married Lillian Maybee in April 1925.

Emigrating didn't end his military career and he joined A Company, Peel and Dufferin Regiment and took A Wing and his Warrant Officer 2 training at the Small Arms School in Ottawa in 1931. The following year he completed his certification at Niagara-on-the-Lake and was promoted to Instructor under the late Capt. Roy Barr of Brampton. During World War II he served at Headquarters C.A.S.F. in England from 1939 to 1945.

Mr. Moreton was a security guard at Brampton Armory for 20 years and retired in 1965. He was a member of St. Paul's Anglican Church, Norval.

Mr. Moreton leaves his wife Lillian and son Herbert at home.

The body rested at McClure-Jones Funeral Home in Georgetown and a graveside service was held at Hillcrest cemetery July 28 at 11 a.m.
