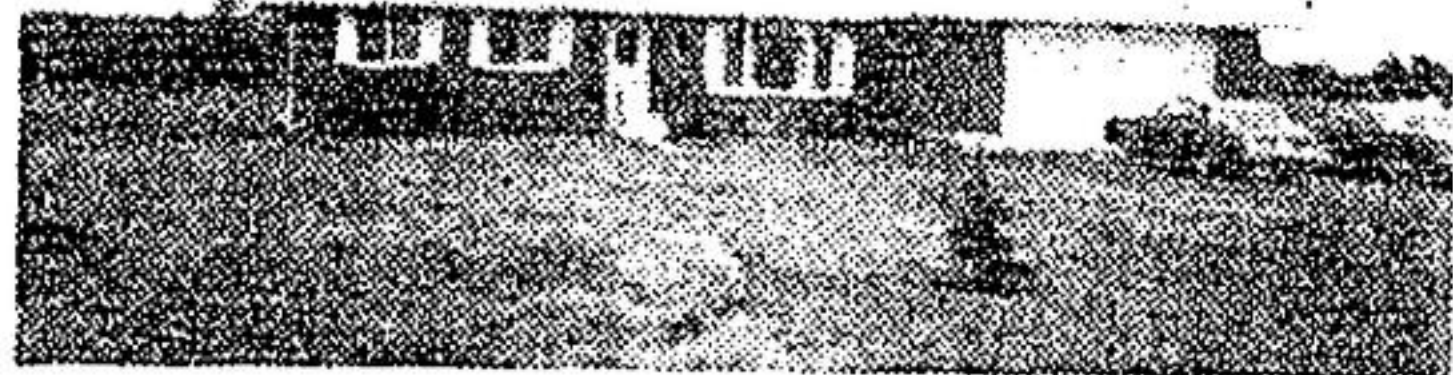

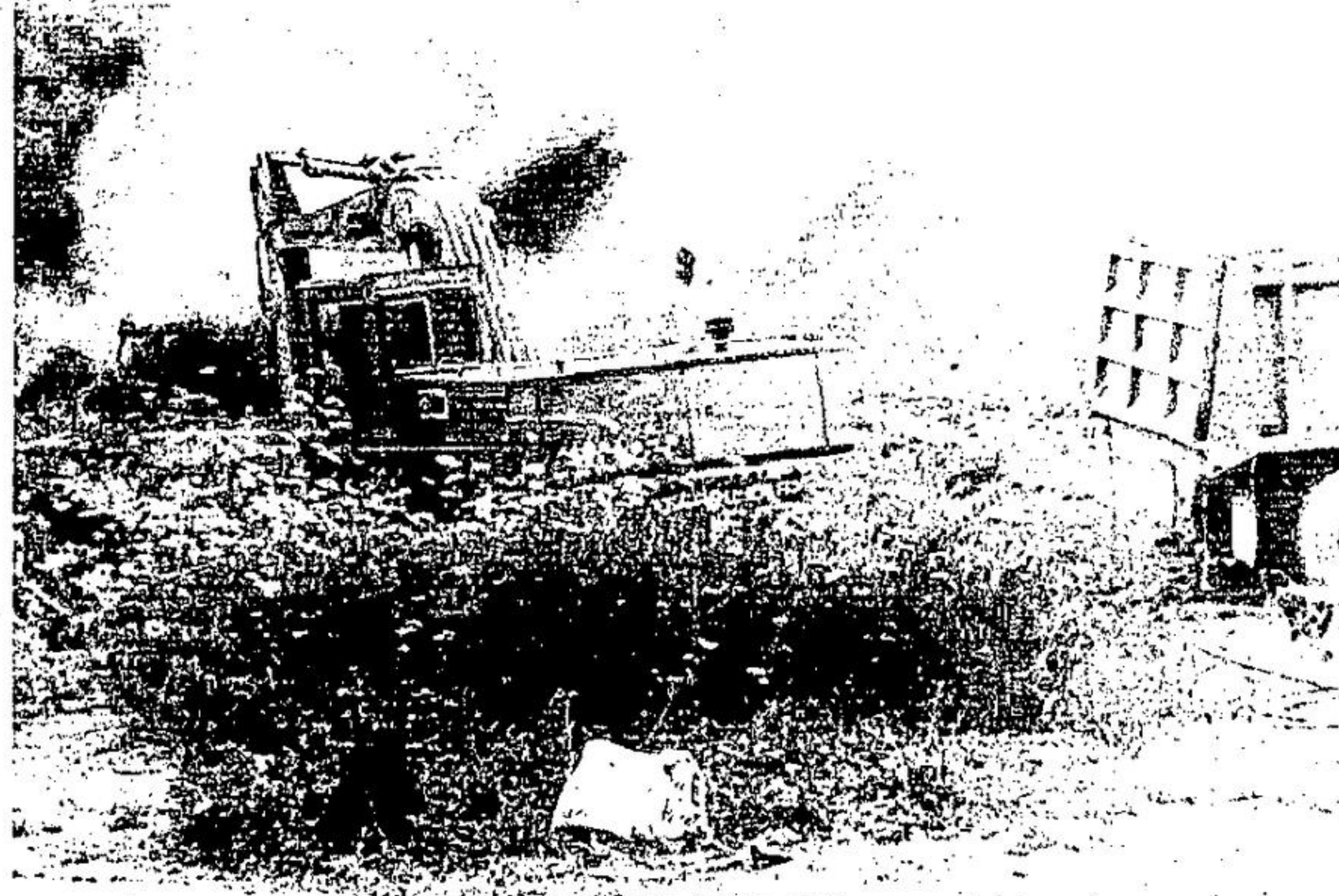

Booth wants town to help the victims of Ontario floods

The fact that the refugees of Indo-China are receiving assistance from the citizens of Halton Hills provides ample justification for town council to allocate disaster relief funds to two Ontario municipalities which have appealed for help, according to Coun. Roy Booth.

Coun. Booth objected to a resolution before council last week which saw the two appeals simply received and filed. This municipality was among those across the province to which flood victims are appealing.

"If we can support the Boat People, we can come up with a few dollars for this," he said. "I don't think they're asking for thousands; if we give them a token \$100, it will be matched by the province."

Coun. Booth reminded his colleagues that Halton Hills may one day find itself in the same position as the township of West Carleton and the region of Sudbury, both of which suffered extensive damage from recent flooding.

Mayor Pete Pomeroy pointed out that town council has

not contributed financially to the efforts of local citizens who are sponsoring the immigration of the Vietnamese refugees. A majority of council members voted to file the applications for assistance.

In the first letter, Kinburn mayor Frank Marchington explained that many communities in West Carleton were severely damaged by Ottawa River floodwaters during late April and early May.

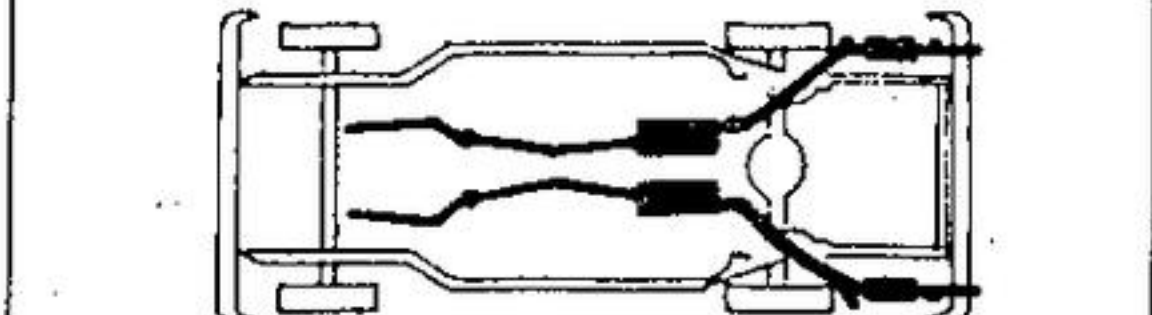
"This damage, which affected residences and business establishments, is not covered by insurance and amounts to thousands of dollars," he said.

Another half-million dollars' worth of damage was also caused by flooding in Sudbury region, according to regional treasurer Roland Beaudry.

Mayor Marchington cited the province's willingness to match each dollar donated with another dollar from government coffers.

Town tries to recover money

Despite objections from Coun. Roy Booth, town council has asked its treasurer to suggest ways of recovering \$4,300 spent on the special boundary study of the Georgetown urban area.

Treasurer Ray King will assess various ways of paying for the study, which examined possible areas for the community's future expansion, including having developers who have land interests in the area, pick up the bill.

Coun. Booth pointed out, though, that Halton Hills and the former town of Georgetown have never asked a developer to finance an exploratory study in the past, reasoning that the developers

should not be allowed to cite their financial involvement in the study as a factor in future decisions, regardless of the study's outcome.

NEEDED COUNCIL
Information gathered in the Georgetown boundary study, Coun. Booth noted, was needed by council to guide the town in future decision-making, and as such should be paid for by the town.

When Coun. Harry Levy said the resolution before council simply sought suggestions from the treasurer, Coun. Booth wondered aloud where the treasurer might draw the line in his deliberations. Which developers and which land interests should be considered, he asked.

"I can't see anything wrong with the resolution," Mayor Pete Pomeroy argued. "For any special study like this, it's not unreasonable to apportion part of the cost to the benefiting developer."
