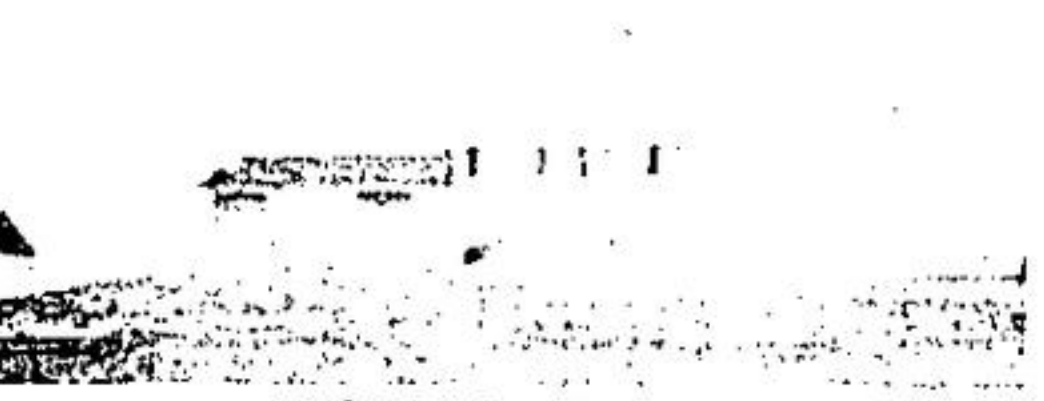

# Seniors' club homeless despite town survey

Acton's Golden Age senior citizens' club is still without a proper home, despite an exhaustive survey of local facilities by recreation co-ordinator Anne Pickering.

The club lost its weekday quarters last March when safety hazards forced the closing of Acton's old town hall. There, Miss Pickering informed the town's general committee Monday night, members found a well-equipped and

suitably furnished meeting hall where they could play cards and other games or rest during their downtown shopping trips.

Miss Pickering explained the club is now meeting twice monthly in St. Alban's parish hall, but hopes to find suitable quarters elsewhere which would be available five days a week.

Miss Pickering assessed several downtown Acton facili-

ties, but varying problems with each one precluded their use as a senior citizens' clubhouse. With no public buildings available downtown, she examined meeting halls at St. Alban's, Knox Presbyterian and Trinity United churches and sought the advice of the Chamber of Commerce, Acton Community Services Centre and Murray Memorial YM-YWCA.

The only facility which prov-

ed suitable, however, was the Mug, a small coffeehouse in the basement of the YMCA building where high school students gather for social evenings during the school season. The Mug was rejected by the Golden Age Club at a meeting in late June, however, Miss Pickering reported.

The recreation co-ordinator asked the general committee to keep the situation in mind so that any new ideas can be referred to the club.

# Town advised against bylaw, but truck controls still sought

A municipal survey of truck traffic along Halton Hills' Fourth Line and 17 Sideroad has prompted the town's deputy engineer to advise against implementing a controlling bylaw, but the town's general committee is still hoping that hourly restrictions can be imposed to protect residents against the aggravations of noise dust and danger.

The town had postponed a decision on a proposed bylaw which would have restricted heavy truck traffic along the two rural roads so that deputy engineer Ted Ballinger could monitor traffic and appraise the bylaw's necessity. Fluctuating traffic move-

ments and the ability of the roads to withstand the traffic led Mr. Ballinger to recommend against the bylaw Monday night, however.

Residents of the area are far from happy with the situation, though, according to Mayor Pete Pomeroy and other committee members who indicated that complaints are still being received about the trucks, most of which are hauling gravel out of wayside pits and the Indusmin quarry south of Acton.

**URGED COMMITTEE**  
One resident, Jim Goodlet, urged the committee to impose restrictions on the truck move-

ments in accordance with the wishes of homeowners who he said have been pleading for five years for some controls. Mr. Goodlet suggested that the town should threaten Indusmin with a bylaw to limit trucks to half loads, a move which he predicted would drastically alter the situation in favor of the residents.

The committee asked town engineer Bob Austin to prepare a report on possible methods of imposing hourly controls on the heavy trucks. Mayor Pomeroy acknowledged that residents are still being disturbed by truck movements early in the morning, despite regulations restricting the traffic to the hours between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Mr. Austin speculated that the problem largely involves the early arrival of trucks at the pits where they will line up along the roadside waiting for loading operations to begin.

Mr. Goodlet reported that there is "all kinds of truck traffic at 4:30 and 5 in the morning."

Mr. Ballinger based his recommendation against the rest-

riking bylaw on the results of three separate surveys taken by town staff at two locations in the problem area. Counts were taken last August, again in November, and again last month.

**COUNTS SHOWED**  
"The traffic counts showed that east of the Sixth Line the number of gravel trucks increased notably from the earliest to the latest count," he reported. "This is explained by the fact that two wayside pits on the Sixth Line have become active over the monitoring period."

"West of the Sixth Line, however, the number of gravel trucks counted fluctuated. The second count was more than double the first but the latest count dropped to less than the first. We are unable to offer a clear explanation for this except to say that it might reflect a variable demand for aggregate from the Fourth Line quarry."

Mr. Ballinger commented that 17 Sideroad is withstanding the truck traffic "quite well," with only routine maintenance required.

Coun. George Maltby has been authorized to represent town council at meetings of a joint union-management committee aimed at finding new jobs for as many as 100 workers who will lose their jobs at Acton's Disston Canada plant next month.

Mayor Pete Pomeroy nominated Coun. Maltby to the liaison position after commending him for acting on the town's behalf during the mayor's recent vacation. Coun. Maltby met with Disston officials along with other council members at a special unofficial meeting late last month.

Coun. Maltby will join two Disston management representatives, two officials of the plant's United Steelworkers of America local and possibly representatives from Canada Manpower during coming weeks to try and co-ordinate the re-location of laid-off employees.

**SELL PLANT**  
Disston announced last month its plans to sell the plant, where industrial wood-working tools are manufactured, to R. Hoe and Company, Incorporated, of Scarsdale, New York.

The production of hand saws and metal cutting tools is to be moved to a Montreal plant operated by Sandvik Canada, Incorporated, Disston's parent company.

R. Hoe's purchase of the Acton plant is subject to approval by the Foreign Investment Review Agency, a branch of the federal government.

While Disston and its workers are hoping that R. Hoe will be able to rehire some 30 workers for operations which will resume at the plant early in October, as has been speculated, there are no plans to relocate other laid-off workers to Montreal. Such transfers have been economically unfeasible.

# Volunteer survey

The second part of a study on community volunteers will be underway this week at the Georgetown Market Plaza.

The study, sponsored by the Halton Regional Social Planning Council, is being conducted by York University student Beth Newell. In the second part of the study, Ms. Newell will talk to about 50 people to determine their attitudes toward volunteering.

"It's a survey about people. It's not geared only to those who have volunteered," Ms. Newell said. "I'm particularly interested in those who have not volunteered. One of the purposes of the survey is to find out why people do not volunteer."

Ms. Newell will be at the Georgetown Market Plaza tomorrow (Thursday) and in Acton late next week.

The first part of the study, which Ms. Newell said is just concluding, consisted of interviewing the social agencies working in North Halton.
