August 13, but when the patch was removed the day after the double vision which had plagued the referee remained.

"There is really no change in my vision," McCauley said. "I still have the double vision."

McCauley was attacked in a New York City restaurant last February and the eye has been operated on twice since. The recent operation was to strengthen the muscle structure in the eye.

"The doctor said to give it a week or so and if there is no change then we'll have to operate again," McCauley said. He had an appointment to see his doctor yesterday.

### FRUSTRATING

"Right now I'm pretty disappointed, but there is nothing I can do but sit and wait," the referee said. "It is a very frustrating experience." Before this recent operation took place, McCauley had said if it were not successful he would have to retire as an official.

"If I still have double vision after this week, we are going to try one more operation before the season begins," he said after the last operation took place.

McCauley said the next operation, if needed, would be on his right eye. The muscles in that eye, which, uninjured, would be tightened to compensate for his left one. It is hoped that would stop the double vision.

McCauley also said that he is preparing a civil suit against the northern Ontario resident who punched him causing the injury.

"Right now there are complications in both the civil and criminal cases because it was a case of two Canadian citizens being in the United States," McCauley said.

The referee said that if the double vision clears up, either

by the recent operation or by a next one, he would be ready to officiate once the hockey season begins.

## Delrex makes a comeback, but Fobert takes the crown

Delrex Tavern made a strong comeback, but it fell short as Fobert Real Estate took a 8-7 victory to win the championship in the Halton Hills Ball Hockey Association.

Before the two-game total goals series began last Tuesday it had been predicted that the two very evenly-matched teams would have a titanic struggle before a winner emerged.

In the first game last Tuesday Fobert jumped ahead 5-1 as they outshot Delrex 31-17.

Wayne Gibson put Fobert ahead with the only goal of the first period with an assist on the play going to Ray Peacock.

In the second period Fobert went ahead 3-0 as Paul Allison tallied from Doug Timpson and Bill Allison and Bill Fournier put one home from John Sargent.

### ROUT THREATENED

Fobert threatened to turn the series into a rout when Fournier got his second of the night in the third period from Timpson and Bill Alli-

son.

Delrex finally got on the board with 3:26 left in the game as Ian Syme scored on an unassisted effort.

With only 2:07 remaining to be played in the first game Timpson scored another goal for Fobert to give them a four-goal bulge. Paul Allison and Bill Bradley drew the assists on the play.

With their backs against the wall Delrex came out flying for the second game and gave Fobert a run for their money.

Syme made it a three-goal deficit with only 1:36 gone in the first period on a play set up by Doug Thompson and Terry Crawford.

At the 6:29 mark Crawford deflected a hard shot from Doug Pemberton past Al Densmore in the Fobert net and it was a two-goal game.

Midway through the first period Chris Milne scored a third Delrex goal of the frame and the once-large Fobert lead had been depleted to one. Rob Lister earned the assist on the play.

With 47 seconds left in the first period Fobert got back a little breathing room as Tim

Turner, the league's leading scorer who had been held pointless until this point in the final, tallied from Bill Allison.

### TIGHT PERIOD

The second period was very tight with neither of the two clubs very willing to give their respective opponents much running room. Delrex's Gary Pemberton, on an unassisted effort, scored the only goal of the frame and it was once again a one-goal margin.

Delrex drew even for the first time in the final with 11:15 remaining to be played as Syme got his third goal from Lister and Crawford.

Bill Allison blasted a shot past Brad Miller in the Delrex net with 4:57 left in the game and Fobert regained the lead. Turner set him up.

Gary Nix scored a needed insurance marker for Fobert with 2:59 left to be played with Timpson and Turner setting him up.

After that goal was scored Fobert began to take penalties which made for a very exciting finish.

Fobert was two-men short for the entire last minute and 21 seconds. Delrex took advantage of the situation when Greg Bodnar scored from Syme and Doug Pemberton. Forty-four seconds were showing on the clock when that goal was scored.

Delrex pulled netminder Brad Miller in the dying seconds as they went all out in an attempt to score the equalizer.
