Kirby leads way

Philp Publishing takes crown, downs Akers-Clark in three

Philp Publishing completed an excellent comeback season in Georgetown Industrial Fastball League play by defeating Akers-Clark Real Estate 16-6 Monday night to take the best of five championship series in three straight games.

Akers-Clark was prepared to forfeit the game after Sunday's second game, but an eleventh hour decision saw the game go in front of a big crowd at the Fairgrounds. Akers-Clark wanted the third game to be postponed until tonight, because key players could not make it out Monday, GIFL president Bryan Lewis refused to alter his schedule. Akers-Clark was going to forfeit the game, but by mid-afternoon Monday they had had a change of heart. LED BY KIRBY

Philp, led by Bill Kirby who was excellent at bat as well as on the field, never gave Akers-Clark breathing room on Monday night.

The winners exploded for seven runs in the fifth inning and never looked back. The big blow in that inning was a three-run shot by Kirby.

Wayne Farrow hit a grandslam for Akers-Clark in the sixth inning, but it proved to be too little and too late.

Akers-Clark had to go into the game without the services of top pitcher Keith McKinnon, starting catcher Al Densmore and star shortstop Larry Peterson. The addition of those three players certainly would have helped Akers-Clark's chanc-

Philp will receive the Labatt's Trophy as the league champions. Acton Merchants took the Bank of Nova Scotia as first place finishers during the regular scason.

The triumph for Philps in the final marked an excellent comeback for coaches Norm

Lockhurst, Howard Kitts and their troops. They had finished the regular season in sixth place and in three playoff series they knocked off teams which had finished higher than them in the standings.

Philp won every playoff game they played this season. In the semi-finals they knocked off the first place Acton Merchants in three straight games.

In the final they jumped ahead of Akers-Clark by taking the first game 5-3 and on Sunday took the second match 11-7.

In the 5-3 win Philp jumped 3.0 in the first inning with Wally Williams, Doug Anderson and Bill Kirby all scoring

Brad Edgar padded the lead to 4-0 when he scored in the second inning and Bob Marchand made it 5-0 in the fifth when he tripled and scored on a sacrifice fly by Anderson.

Akers-Clark did not get on the scoreboard until the bot-

tom of the ninth when they scored all three of their runs. Randy Coulson, Les Wilson and Wayne Farrow all crossed the plate and all three runs were unearned. Philp pitcher Jeff Gimple retired Werner Mikolelt on a ground ball to end the game.

Akers-Clark tied the score at seven in the sixth inning when McKinnon got a single and came around to score on Peterson's triple.

In the seventh inning Philp went back in front as Anderson got his third single of the game and then scored on an CITOT.

Philp put the game out of reach in the eighth scoring three more runs. Edgar and Marchand doubled and pitcher Danny Engleby scored on an error.

The same two clubs had met to decide the league championship last year. On that occasion Akers-Clark, then Georgetown Chrysler, defeated Philp, then Harley Motors, in four games.


