Limehouse's Ray Odorico and his prize-winning Black Labrador Retriever "Zeke" face 40 other champion dogs Sept. 22 and 23 at the Gaines Ontario Retriever Trials near Port Perry, Ont.

Competing dogs and their handlers will gather from across Ontario, several provinces and the United States.

Organized by the Ontario Retriever Field Trial Association, the prestigious meet is sponsored by the makers of Gaines dog foods. Eligibility for the trial is limited to dogs who have placed in an ORFTA licensed trial in the open stake. There were just 60 dogs eligible this year.

Dogs will follow a course through land and water to gauge their courage, obedience, memory and natural abilities. Judges for the event are George De Young of Fonthill, Ont. and Sig Vilagi of Wisconsin.

Spectators have been invited without charge to the trial which will run from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m., rain or shine. Headquarters will be at Goreski Lakeside Resort on Seugog Island.

Halton Hills Jill Gymnastic Club president Marg Lamothe has been with the group for three years. During that time she was on a number of committees and this is her second term as president.

The club has 40 girls enrolled. It offers gymnastic instruction for competitive and pre-competitive girls and is run through the town recreation department. The department provides facilities and coaches and the fees are set by the department in conjunction with the executive. The club belongs to the Ontario Gymnastic Federation. Parents of the girls in the club belong to the group's parents' volunteer club and help in fund raising activities, organizing and running local meets, arranging uniforms and maintaining liaison with O.G.F. The girls' fees are based on the amount of work out time they use weekly and whether they are in the competitive or pre-competitive level. Competitive level girls usually work out for 14 hours each week plus doing 3/4 of an hour of ballet. Pre-competitive girls do eight hours of work out as well as ballet.
