Hire assistant director

Education director wants changes

The director of education for the Halton board of education has proposed a re-structuring of the senior administration of the board, the first major change proposed since the board's formation ten years ago.

Mr. Lavender said there are a number of factors involved which had caused him to examine the senior administrative structure. Among them are the vacancy in the position of the employee relations assistant, the vacancy

effective January 1, of the position of superintendent of instruction, and the job description for the position of superintendent of instruction.

He also said that the school system is contracting, and re-designing the administration would be one way of coping with that. He said the board should also bear in mind the decision it would have to make in the future as to a new director. His proposal that the board appoint an assistant director, could solve the pro-

blem if the board wished to hire the assistant with the understanding that if his or her work proved satisfactory, they would be considered for the position of director, Mr. Lavender said.

REVISED STRUCTURE

Under the revised structure, the position of superintendent of instruction would be eliminated and the positions of assistant director and director of personnel and employee relations would be created. The director of personnel and

employee relations would be responsible for negotiations on behalf of the board, and for administration of the collective agreements.

The assistant director would be responsible for professional development, supervision of instructional staff, promotions, academic personnel, and chairman of the administrative council of the executive committee.

The change in structure also calls for the elimination of one area superintendent's position,

and the change of another to area superintendent, special services.

"I would suggest in time this organization would serve the board more efficiently and at a lower cost," Mr. Lavender said.

Trustee Cam Jackson suggested that the area superintendent for special services position should be rotated among school principals.

"It wouldn't mean leaving a valuable plum for one of our neighboring boards to raid from that position," he said.

Trustee Bill Lawson, vice-

chairman of the board, expressed his appreciation to the director for giving the board some "sense of direction" about possible changes in the administration. He said he would like to see the board give priority to the assistant director position, should they decide to adopt the new structure. He also said the salary of the assistant director should be related to the director's salary, and not to the secondary school principal's salary.

The proposal will be brought to the next board meeting for voting.

Students' difficulties revealed

Halton students scored well on tests in arithmetic and French, but did more poorly than expected in visual arts, problem solving and language arts test conducted by the Halton board of education.

The tests were conducted to fulfill aims included in the board's aims and objectives for 1979-80, which require field testing with tests planned by Halton teachers.

In presenting the test results, Dr. Robert Dixon, superintendent of program, made a number of recommendations for changes in program to reflect conclusions drawn from the test results.

In mathematics tests, the students were found to be performing well above the national norm in basic arithmetical operations, but they are not doing well in problem solving and geometry. Dr. Dixon recommended teacher workshops to stress the development of problem solving skills.

In social sciences for grades 7 and 8 students, the area of lowest performance was in decision-making and problem solving, and the recommendation was to revise the program to upgrade student abilities in

problem-solving.

In testing on Canadian geography in grades 9 and 10, the test results indicate the core curriculum is too demanding, Dr. Dixon said.

Trustee Len Crozier asked why the teachers who wrote the program from ministry guidelines had not recognized

this fact in the beginning.

TEACHER TEAM

Dr. Dixon said the team of teachers in Halton who wrote the program were aware the guidelines were a legal document so they tended to take it as is.

Board chairman Bill Herd was particularly concerned

about the results of testing of students in grades 4, 7 and 10 in language arts, where 90 per cent of the grade 4 students, 70 per cent of the grade 7 students and 50 per cent of the grade 10 students, found over one-half of the passages difficult to read.

Junk food challenge

Ontario Health Minister Dennis Timbrell has issued a challenge to all high schools, staff, students and school boards, to get junk food out of Ontario schools.

While addressing an assembly of high school students at the Sudbury Secondary School, Mr. Timbrell announced that 20 prizes of \$1,000 would be given out to the 20 schools which are most successful in developing campaigns to cut back junk foods in school and promote nutritional awareness during the school year.

The awards will go to the student councils of the winning schools to be used to develop future health-related activities for students.

Ron Chapman, superintendent of special services in Halton, said the board has not received official notification of the project yet.
