Georgetown's MP settles into his new post

Brampton-Georgetown MP John McDermid carved a bit of history for himself last Tuesday when he sat in Canada's Parliament for the first time. Since his May 22 election victory over Liberal incum-

bent Ross Milne, the new MP has thrown all his energy into federal politics.

And he loves it.

In a two-hour interview the 39-year-old Brampton resident talked about his expectations in Ottawa, the new minority government under Prime

Minister Joe Clark and what it's tike being a federal MP. His bom and optimism reflects a trend that has developed since Joe Clark's party took over power.

"There's an excellent feeling in the party," says Mr. McDermid. "The spirits are high and the prime minister is fantastic He is available to

any members of the caucus within 48 hours."

Unlike most new governments, he says, the Tories skipped the "honeymoon" period.

HONEYMOON "We haven't had the honeymoon enjoyed by most governments. The party hasn't had the opportunity to be lulled into a false sense of security. In a way that's positive because it's kept us all on our toes."

The hot issue in the upcoming parliament will be Petro-Can, he says. Prime Minister Clark has

stuck to his campaign promise to sell part of the crown corporation, a move that could bring the ruling Tories crashing down if the three opposition parties - Liberals, NDP and Social Credit - vote against it.

"PetroCan is not doing what it originally set out to do and that is to get a handle on the Canadian oil industry. I believe the private sector can run it more effeciently," Mr. McDermid explains.

He's behind his party's stance but stresses the companies that make up PetroCan should be sold to Canadian and not foreign firms.

On the question of energy, Mr. McDermid says the prime minister has to reach a compromise somewhere down the line in order to satisfy both the western provinces - rich in reserves - and eastern Canada.

"The guys out west are looking down the road to when their resources run out," he

In recent months Ontario Premier William Davis has argued strongly against Alberta's proposal to put Canadian oil prices on par with the world market. Such a move would hike the price per barrel from \$13.75 to upwards of \$25. GOALSSET

As a backbencher, Mr. McDermid has already set goals for himself.

"I want to be the best backbencher this riding's ever had and would like to be known as an available and approachable member. The second goal is to really get involved in the life of Parliament and the committees I serve. People in this riding elected me to go to Ottawa to represent them."

He describes parliamentary life as an "artificial world".

"The House of Commons is a very unique area. You work, eat and socialize with the same and live in a city you don't really feel part of."

"My time is no longer my own really. The long days, the travel, the loss of privacy are public duties. And to be an effective member you had belter realize that."

Mr. McDermid, married with no children, plans to spend five days in Ottawa and fly home to Brampton on weekends. Sometime this week he'll be

Red Cross loses appeal

A belated appeal by the Georgetown and district branch of the Red Cross failed Monday night to sway the town's decision increasing rental rates for the branch's office space in the Cedarvale community centre.

Mayor Pete Pomeroy assured branch spokesman Tina Yaremy that town council would find some way to recover the Red Cross deficit for 1979, estimated at about \$72 even if a hat had to be passed among its members.

The town's general committee voted, however, to refer Mrs. Yaremy's objection to the i six per cent annual rent inerease to its special budget committee for consideration next spring.

Mrs. Yaremy responded to news of the proposed rent hike in similar fashion to spokesmen for other affected groups, but said she was unaware she · could attend a municipal meeting in the same manner as a · representative of the Maple Co-operative Nursery School did two weeks ago,

COUNCIL LETTER Repeating the warning she gave in a letter to councit, Mrs. . Yaremy said additional expenses for the branch could · force the reduction or cancellation of some existing ser-· vices. The branch fell \$5,000 short of its 1979 fund-raising

goal, she said. Coun. Russ Miller acknowledged that the Red Cross · performed "a great service" in Halton Hills, but said the town is similarly hard-pressed to make ends meet in the area of rental facilities.

Superior

Council "can't make exceptions". Mayor Pomeroy agreed, adding that he is investigating the situation in Burlington, where the local Red Cross branch receives a municipal grant.

"I don't even think I was canvassed." he said of the annual fund-raising campaign. "but I'm pretty sure we could drum up \$72 for you in a hurry without going to the grant system, whether it's by canvassing councillors or whatev-

 Asked by Coun. Harry Levy why the fund-raising campaign failed to meet expectations this year, Mrs. Yaremy explained that a major factor is that few donors involved in payroll deduction plans at their places of work realize they can specify that their donations must go directly to the Georgetown branch.




