Last week I had a birthday. I am not really expecting this pronouncement to be greeted by a fanfare of trumpets, a solemn roll of drums or a red carpet rolled down my driveway, as there is certainly nothing very unique about having a birthday.

This was not even a very special birthday. I was not moving from one decade into another, it was just one of those silly, indeterminate, change in numbers that I would simply prefer to forget.

I am convinced I was born either too soon or too late. As a child, I was constantly reminded to respect my elders and to pay heed to the knowledge they had acquired throughout their lifetimes. I even decided to forego the enormous banner I normally string across the entrance hall stating: 'Guess who's birthday is coming?' and eliminated my usual practice of scattering decorative gift bows around the living room.

No fuss

Yes, except for being remembered by my mother and whatever would we do without mothers in this world this particular birthday just slipped away into oblivion to join a host of others.

I firmly told myself, this was what I wanted; this was the way I had planned it. No birthday cake candles, no muss no fuss. If there are no advantages to be gained in growing older, why bother?

Then why did I feel so bad - so neglected? Had I been wrong not to remind them to remember?

Two days later my husband, full of early morning good cheer, wished me a happy birthday. He looked so pleased with himself for having remembered, I just did not have the heart to disillusion him by telling him he had the wrong day.

I guess I am stuck with a new birth date from now on, or possibly, even a flexible one.

However, I will admit, it was nicer to celebrate a birthday that wasn't, rather than nothing at all. Maybe next year I will remember to resurrect that hallway banner once



The club, which has 14 members at present, meets on the first and third Thursday of each month in member's homes. Members take up a collection at meetings but there are no annual dues. The club is aimed mainly at giving members a social outing but members do a lot of quilting and hold an annual bazaar. The proceeds from this year's bazaar amounted to more than \$1,200 dollars and will be donated to local charities. Although members do not do crafts at their meetings the variety of hand knitted items as well as home sewn articles, home baking, home made candy, jams and jellies and assorted crafts who are donated to the baznar indicates that the members pursue many hobbies as well as quilting.

Mrs. Puckering was widowed in 1963. She came to Canada from England in 1914 and moved to Terra Cotta when she married in 1929. She has a son in Collingwood and
