# Halton refuses licences for first week of hunting

Let's start off on a sour note. The town of Halton refused to release the township hunting licence until Oct. 6, 1979, when the hunting season opened on September 29, 1979, thereby making sportsmen miss a full week of the season which is usually the best, the first 3 days of the season recorded as the best.

## NO EXCUSE

The town even issued a letter to the licence issuers not to release them sooner, even though they were on hand. There is no excuse for this action, and it is felt that this is just another way of keeping the number of hunters down.

This may be accepted as an open letter to the officials in charge, and adequate space will be provided for rebuttal. That is strong wording but that is the way I and others feel an answer should be presented.

## REHABILITATION

The Ministry of Natural Resources in conducting a stream rehabilitation work shop where the work on stream bank erosion control, has made a great difference. This project is part of the S.P.O.F. program, and in case you have not heard of it, that is strategic planning for Ontario fisheries, and contains many such projects to improve fishing in Ontario. The workshop is this Saturday Oct. 20 at Claremont Conservation Area 9.30 a.m. till 3.30 p.m. Fishing for Bass is good, but you have to fish a little different for them now.

The cold water and air make them a little lethargic and a s-l-o-w retrieve of a diving plug, made to return just under the surface or over the tops of dying weeds should do it.

Deeper water is preferred and if there is a bit of live weed left, then give it a try. Often a plug left sitting and moving with the wave current will bring on a strike, but experiment til you hit the type and speed of action and a full stringer is not unlikely. Thirty minutes in one area is not too much as they will not move far or fast to feed. That is the way of Bass at this time of year and only the hearty will go for them. If you want time away without heading for the Rainbow Trout waters, try late fall Bass, it just may turn you on to late fishing.
