Friday night the Georgetown goal scorers were Shafer, McGilloway with four, McMenemy a single, Andy Broadbent a single, Tony Giannini with a pair, and Bill Taylor a single.

Thursday Steve Crossman was the only one who could put the puck in the net for the Gems.

"I've got them mad enough to win," says Daley. And that may have resulted in the team's performance to date. They are now sporting a record of four wins, six losses and one tie. They have nine points, and are only three behind last year's point total of 12, with 33 games left to play. A good turnout from last year's dismal season.

Yet it is nothing to sit back on. They still aren't playing the 500 hockey they had planned. "The playoffs are our priority," Daley states. "No one is going to push us around."
