# Updating a parable to computer age

Jesus often used parables of the field as he spoke to an agrarian age of God as the source of growth towards the fullness of our created purpose. I am the vine... you are the branches... my Father is the gardener." (Cf. John 15)

Had he taught in our electronic age, can we imagine Jesus saying, "I am the wiring system, and my Father is the power company. Every appliance that is not plugged in does not work, and any appliance that doesn't work when it is plugged in is thrown out on the dump."

Truly in any age, the power to be the sort of glorious persons we are meant to be comes from God. So often we are content to remain what we are because we fail to see what we can be - bearers of good fruit in love, joy and peace; or to update the image, appliances that really show forth the brightness of God's glory and radiate the warmth of his love.

Are we firmly plugged into the source of this power to grow? Worship through Word and Sacrament in the fellowship of faith, regular prayer and study of the Scriptures: these keep us drawing on

divine energy when our own is so limited, and give us strength to work as we are intended to work.

So often our spiritual life is treated like the family TV. We take it for granted until something goes wrong. Only regular care and maintenance, replacing outdated components, can prepare us to meet the demands of constant use. Are we trying to fit three-pronged plugs into the two-wire system of a childhood faith? Do we run at half-speed, a 60 cycle machine on a 25 cycle circuit?

Growth and development mean constant change and upgrading of our faith. I can well remember our first TV - a 200 pound box of tubes and wires with an 11 inch screen that took 20 minutes to warm up. Today's sets are much smaller, have huge pictures, and light up the instant the "on" button is pushed. Today's Christians, faced with a bewildering of issues and challenges need the very best in solid-state circuitry: they must be alive in the Spirit, knowing God's presence within, to become effective and portable vehicles of the love of Christ and the power of God.

God is the one and only source of energy guaranteed never to run out: but we have to stay connected.
