Adopting wild animals against the law

Every year people must be reminded of one major fact; it is illegal to keep wild animals. One more occurance has turned up, where the FAWN "adopted" a family and was kept in their barn. Suddenly the "kind folks" decided to take the young deer to Mountsburg Wildlife Centre, and to remind everyone again I am quoting the law against keeping wild animals. The Game and Fish Act, RSO 1970-79(1) states "Except under the authority of a licence issued on such terms and conditions as are prescribed in the regulations, no person shall keep live game or a wolf in captivity for more than ten days 1961-62, c.48, s.71(1); 1964, c.34, s.14 amended.

DO NOT MOLEST ANIMALS

I believe that is plain enough, or take the word of the conservation officers when they state that you must not molest or otherwise handle wildlife. If one (animal) insists on "adopting" your property or "family" then call the Ministry of Natural Resources. Don't even try to keep these wild creatures for the ten days supposedly allowed.

While I am on the regulations, let's take a look at trapping. Trapping is forbidden without a licence and is regulated (article 57). Fixed number of animals and designated area for each trap line (Art. 58). Pelt must not be destroyed or spoiled (Art. 67). No person shall touch or interfere with any set trap, unless authorized to do so by law or the owner thereof (Art. 59). This one (Article) protects traps on a registered line from interference by well meaning bigits that don't like traps. No non resident shall be the holder of a licence to trap fur bearing animals (Article 54-(3)). So, that relieves the thought of the country being "over-run" by trappers. As you can see, trapping is well regulated.

It is of course a controversial issue, due to the bad publicity of the anti-hunting, anti-trapping, anti-everything groups who have distorted the facts and giving us a black eye that will be a long time healing. If you could read the trash that is sent out to the members of these groups, you would wonder how they are even in existence. Memos such as how to sabotage the hunting season for those of us that enjoy the outdoors. Childish nonsense but many people are following their advice, as it is the way of getting on the band wagon,

TANNING HIDES

Enough of that, here is an idea for another way of tanning hides.

Two ounces of Oxalic Acid, 8 ounces of Salt, 1 gallon warm water. Soak hide one day, tack on a board to dry and leave in a warm room. Then wash off the salt and dry again. You may then work the skin to make if soft, preferably while it is drying the second time.


On Saturday Richmond Hill came to town and the
