Both drivers are killed No hiring change in head-on collision refused to approve a stronglycontested public works com-

Two Acton men were killed and three others injured in a head-on collision on Highway 7 near Silvercreek late Friday

W. Allen Keir, 19, and David Brown, 24, drivers of the two vehicles, died in the collision just west of the intersection of Trafalgar Road and Highway 7 at Silvercreek.

Injured in the accident were Mark Brill, 21, Larry McGilloway, 22, and Robert Brenton, 22, all of Acton, and all passengers in Mr. Brown's car. Mr. Brill and Mr. McGilloway suffered facial

cuts and were admitted to Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital, Mr. Brenton suffered a gash to his shin. He was also taken to Georgetown Hospital, where

he was treated and released. The accident was investigated by Constable Ivan Levesque of the Milton OPP, who said the accident occurred about ten minutes past midnight. Mr. Brown, driving a 1970 Camaro, was westbound on Highway 7 at about 50 miles per hour. He was travelling about 400 yards behind a Halton Regional Police cruiser, also headed towards Acton.

The car driven by Mr. Keir, a 1971 Pinto, was castbound on Highway 7, in the eastbound lane, when it passed the eruiser. Constable Levesque said, but once the car was past the cruiser, it crossed over into the westbound lane, where it collided with the other car. It is not known whether the car went out of control, or if it was pulling oul to pass the vehicle ahead of it.

Both vehicles were writeoffs. One fireman at the scene of the accident was heard to comment that he had never

seen such extensive damage

Constable Levesque said road conditions Friday night were poor, with high winds and light snow which melted on contact with the road surface.

Local farmers speak against regional plan

"The best way you can help the farmer", an irate Rod Pinkney has told regional council, "is to get off his

back". Mr. Pinkney was one of two Halton Hills farmers who addressed last week's council meeting expressing opposition to aspects of the new regional

official plan. Council took no actions in response to the objections raised.

Mr. Pinkney, like fellow speaker Peter Branch, said the regional plan was too restrictive, particularly its section outlining an agricultural code

of practice. "The regional plan is based on stewardship", Mr. Branch

"Ladies and gentlemen", he added, "we are not living in Russia or China", where stewardship is the common

system of farming. Halton Hills Coun. Roy Booth, chairman of the regional planning committee, contended that the concept of stewardship was part of a staff report, used in formulating the official plan, not part of the official plan.

Coun. Booth added that the code of practice for agriculture is intended to protect

"The code of practice is a single-edged sword we can use to help the farmer", he said. Bob White, a regional plan-

The code, he said, restricts the location of non-farming residences near farms involved in animal husbandry or those which use large quantities of animal manure.

The code also restricts the number of animals a farmer can keep and the amount and times at which he can spread

Mr. Pinkney and Mr. Branch called the code too restrictive. "We have to make smells", Mr. Branch said, "we can't take the odor out of manure".

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

APPEAL POSSIBLE IN FIREARM CASE

Halton Crown Attorney James Treleaven is considering an appeal against a sentence handed out to a Georgetown man convicted of handling a firearm in a careless manner. Barry Bryant, 30, of Georgetown was given three years' probation on the charge, which had been reduced from pointing a firearm. Mr. Bryant did not plead quilty to the charge as was incorrectly stated in a Herald story last week.

He pleaded innocent, and is now also considering an appeal of his conviction. The charge was laid in connection with an incident November 6 when two police officers answering a domestic call were confronted on the scene by a man holding a rifle. The man ordered the officers off the property. He was apprehended later some distance from the house.
