Committee members agreed with Mr. Pomeroy's comments and made the recommendation to staff requesting a bridge design with only two lanes.

Committee rejected the other two main alternatives, which would have resulted in either a new, major bypass west of Regional Road 19 or the rebuilding of the existing road through Norval, stating that the present and immediately forseeable traffic flows do not require such changes.

"It will be about another 25 years before we'll need a bypass," Hallon Hills Coun. Mike Armstrong commented.

The steel truss bridge, slated for replacement, was originally constructed in 1905. It was temporardy reinforced in 1972 to bring it up to legal road

The environmental report noted that "the bridge has a clear span of 17 metres 155 feet) in width and a narrow, deficient deck width of 3.7 metres (12 feet).

COUNTY STUDY In 1970, the former County of Halton commissioned a study which identified several afternative courses of action. That study recommended Regional Road 19 be realigned by means of the "straight through construction of the Esquesing-Chinguacousy boundary road, including an overpass at Highway 7 and a new structure over the Credit River.

In August, 1977, the regional works department commissioned the Plulips firm to carry out an environmental impact study, instructing the consultants to identify an afternative with the least impact to the natural and human environment in the Norval area, which would also provide adequate service to the travelling public at a reasonable cost.


