Halton riding

'No problem' for Jelinek?

Incumbent Halton MP Otto Jelinek will be running again, although he has not been officially nominated by the Pro-

gressive Conservative riding association. He expects an association meeting to be held early in January.

Mr Jelinek said he will not campaign hard over Christmas and New Year's holidays because "it's not a proper time to impose on people, especially politically."

Brian Cargill, president of the Action Progressive Conservative Association, said he has no apprehensions about Mr. Jelinek's chances in town.

"Otto's done more for this riding than any other man has attempted," he said.

Local campaign machinery has been "in neutral with the engine running," since Parliament opened, he added, so little work will be needed to mobilize.

NDP candidate in the May election Doug Black said he has not given a second candidacy much thought, and does not know if he will run again. He said he was "totally surprised" by the vote last week.

Liberal Frank Philbrook had no statement to make about either the vote or his intentions to run in the upcoming February election.

In the May election, Mr. Jelinek took all 17 polls in the Acton area.

"The defeat of the Tory government has disappointed Mr. Jelinek more for the sake of the country than for himself," he commented.

Speaking from his office in Ottawa just hours after the Liberal and New Democratic Party members combined to bring down the Clark government, Mr. Jelinek said the budget had not been given a chance to prove itself yet, and that the opposition was acting for personal gain in the vote.

"I feel very strongly our government, although it did make a few mistakes, was doing what it felt was right for Canada. The other parties forced an election from political reasons."

He plans to fight his campaign on the budget question.

Mr. Jelinek refused to make any predictions about the outcome of the election, either within Halton or nationally.

"I think it depends on whether people want to go deeper into debt being spoon fed by a socialist government, or face reality and bite the bullet."

The election, he added, will cost more than \$50 million.

NDP candidate in the May election, Doug Black, an Oakville lawyer, called the Clark government "totally incompetent."

"It deserved to be defeated," he said.

"The Canadian people didn't expect the Tory government

would do all the stupid things they've done," he said.

Mr. Black termed the budget presented by Finance Minister John Crosbie as "odious."

Liberal Frank Philbrook,

who was unseated in the May election by a margin of 9,770 votes said he had no statement to make.

"It's too soon and too sudden."

Plan ok'd for complex

Town council has approved a conceptual design for the \$1.7-million arts and crafts, theatre and library complex, to be built around the existing Georgetown public library, giving the architect the go-ahead to complete a final design.

at Monday's meeting following a 90-minute closed-door session on the project.

After council gave its approval, Mayor Pete Pomeroy stressed that no decision will be made on construction and no money spent until after tenders have

been received in April.

"A full presentation of the architectural plans will be made early in January", Mayor Pomeroy said.

Cost brochures and fundraising schemes will also be unveiled at that time, he added.

**Rezoning is approved
for Main Street housing**

The town's planning board has followed up on a decision by the Ontario Municipal Board (OMB) by approving the rezoning of seven acres of land for low-density housing near the Main and Maple Street intersection in Georgetown.

Maple Avenue, in the vicinity of Market Street and Valley Road.

A staff report on the rezoning noted that the OMB conducted a hearing on the matter in August and issued its decision October 16.

In its decision, the OMB said the lands should be designated for low-density housing and gave draft approval to the residential subdivision.

A single-family residential

development of large lots is proposed for the site, the staff report said, with the other 9.8 acres to remain as "open space".

According to the staff report, when the rezoning was first requested, the lands to be redesignated originally involved only 4.1 acres.
