Gems' big week need another one

A missed breakaway and a late third period goal by the Streetsville Derbys, Sunday night, may have prevented the Gemini from completing their most successful week of the season. As it is, it was just (still) a good week.

Carrying this week's backto-back wins, over Milton and Burlington, into the home game at Alcott the Gems were trailing the league leading Derbys 6-4 with a little over seven minutes to play in the game. Greg Thompson and Dave McGilloway went in on the Derbys' net and missed an opportunity to put their team within one goal. The Derbys immediately came back and didn't miss their chance to go three goals ahead and ended up six in front at the game's

"They just gave up", after the Derbys' seventh goal, Gem coach Tom Daley said. "If we'd (Gems) scored that (breakaway) goal and come within one, we might have won," The Gems trailed from the start. Streetsville opened up a 2-0 first period lead. The Gems rallied in the second for three goals, by Andy Broadbent, Herb Kewley and Steve Crossman. Streetsville pumped in four in that same length of time to take a 6-3 tead.

Marty Power's return to the Gem lineup paid off once again with a goal midway through the final frame, to bring the two teams closer together. Then the breakaway and the subsequent four goals by the winners.

"We came off an exceptional game, (against Burlington) we were psyched up for and I thought it would carry over," into Sunday's game, Daley said. The game in Burlington Thursday night was the Gems' "best game" of the season, their coach says.

Marty Power and Steve Crossman led the team, with a pair of goals each, to the 7-6 win. Dave McGilloway, Greg Thompson and Ben Allen added singles to the Georgetown cause. "We deserved to win," said the winning coach "but, we didn't play that well. We didn't give out as much as they did".

Still the Gems won over a team that had beat them 10-1 in the Gems' opening game of the season. That, however, was avenged with a 4-3 Gem win two weeks later. And now to beat the same team, who are ahead of them in the standings, they must have played a good game.

The Gems had a four-game winning streak going into . Sunday night's contest with Streetsville. Those points have driven their season total up to 12 wins, 11 losses and three ties for 27 points and the respectable .500 plus average.

The Gems have lost big in their other two games with the Burlington team, who beat Orillia Saturday night 9-2. These are the only two teams the Gems have yet to beat.

Tomorrow the Gems begin perhaps their stiffest test of the season. "This will make or break us," Daley says. Thursday night they are in Dixie, Friday in Millon and home Sunday to Oakville. Their seventh place standing in the league is sure to change.
