The full cast went into a short rendition of "Born Free", with Andreas Thiel at the piano, which leased us as we anticipated the full piece. Having now depicted the adolescent growth pattern to us through the T.V. game, we were entertained by Rob Munro in a creative movement-vocal routine to the tune of the American National Anthem, which showed this actor had a flair for comedy and possessed natural movement around the stage.




