Milton needs more - Gordon

Prompted by a letter from Millon Mayor Don Gordon, Halton region's administration and finance committee will be reassessing Bill 151, the provincial act which established

the region in 1974. Regional council approved a committee recommendation tast week requesting the region's four area municipalities to review the bill and send their recommendations to the committee by February 1.

The section of the bill that Mayor Gordon was concerned about sets out the number of regional councillors who can represent each of the municipalities, based on representation by population.

"Now that regional government has been in operation for almost six years, I feel a review of the complement of regional elected officials is warranted", he said in his letter to the administration and finance committee.

Mayor Gordon told the Herald he made the decision to request the review after looking at 1979 population figures. "The 1979 census shows that

the representation by population system has been knocked out of whack", he said.

SOME INCREASE Mayor Gordon included in his letter a series of figures to support his claim, which showed that the only substantial increase in the percentage of regional population, from 1974 to 1979, occurred in Milton. The figures also showed that the only decrease occurred in Haltun Hills.

Halton Hills Mayor Pele Pomeroy told The Herald that it appears Mayor Gordon would like to take one councillor from Halton Hills and add one to Milton.

"Population shouldn't be the only factor used in determining representation", Mayor Pomeroy said. "You have to take into account land mass and the fact that Halton Hills has two urban areas".

In 1974, Halton Hills had 15.5 per cent of the regional population and Milton had 7.7 per cent, according to the figures accompanying Mayor Gordon's letter.

By 1979, Halton Hill's share decreased to 14.1 per cent, while Milton's increased to 10.1 per cent.

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


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


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
